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HIGH ALERT: SCAM WARNING!!!

TO ALL SUPPLIERS AND SERVICE PROVIDERS OF THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS

It has come to the attention of the GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS that there are certain unscrupulous companies and individuals who are defrauding unsuspecting businesses disguised as representatives of the Government Printing Works (GPW).

The scam involves the fraudsters using the letterhead of *GPW* to send out fake tender bids to companies and requests to supply equipment and goods.

Although the contact person's name on the letter may be of an existing official, the contact details on the letter are not the same as the *Government Printing Works*'. When searching on the Internet for the address of the company that has sent the fake tender document, the address does not exist.

The banking details are in a private name and not company name. Government will never ask you to deposit any funds for any business transaction. *GPW* has alerted the relevant law enforcement authorities to investigate this scam to protect legitimate businesses as well as the name of the organisation.

Example of e-mails these fraudsters are using:

PROCUREMENT@GPW-GOV.ORG

Should you suspect that you are a victim of a scam, you must urgently contact the police and inform the *GPW*.

GPW has an official email with the domain as @gpw.gov.za

Government e-mails DO NOT have org in their e-mail addresses. All of these fraudsters also use the same or very similar telephone numbers. Although such number with an area code 012 looks like a landline, it is not fixed to any property.

GPW will never send you an e-mail asking you to supply equipment and goods without a purchase/order number. *GPW* does not procure goods for another level of Government. The organisation will not be liable for actions that result in companies or individuals being resultant victims of such a scam.

Government Printing Works gives businesses the opportunity to supply goods and services through RFQ / Tendering process. In order to be eligible to bid to provide goods and services, suppliers must be registered on the National Treasury's Central Supplier Database (CSD). To be registered, they must meet all current legislative requirements (e.g. have a valid tax clearance certificate and be in good standing with the South African Revenue Services - SARS).

The tender process is managed through the Supply Chain Management (SCM) system of the department. SCM is highly regulated to minimise the risk of fraud, and to meet objectives which include value for money, open and effective competition, equitability, accountability, fair dealing, transparency and an ethical approach. Relevant legislation, regulations, policies, guidelines and instructions can be found on the tender's website.

Fake Tenders

National Treasury's CSD has launched the Government Order Scam campaign to combat fraudulent requests for quotes (RFQs). Such fraudulent requests have resulted in innocent companies losing money. We work hard at preventing and fighting fraud, but criminal activity is always a risk.

How tender scams work

There are many types of tender scams. Here are some of the more frequent scenarios:

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to a company to invite it to urgently supply goods. Shortly after the company has submitted its quote, it receives notification that it has won the tender. The company delivers the goods to someone who poses as an official or at a fake site. The Department has no idea of this transaction made in its name. The company is then never paid and suffers a loss.

OF

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to Company A to invite it to urgently supply goods. Typically, the tender specification is so unique that only Company B (a fictitious company created by the fraudster) can supply the goods in question.

Shortly after Company A has submitted its quote it receives notification that it has won the tender. Company A orders the goods and pays a deposit to the fictitious Company B. Once Company B receives the money, it disappears. Company A's money is stolen in the process.

Protect yourself from being scammed

- If you are registered on the supplier databases and you receive a request to tender or quote that seems to be from a government department, contact the department to confirm that the request is legitimate. Do not use the contact details on the tender document as these might be fraudulent.
- Compare tender details with those that appear in the Tender Bulletin, available online at www.gpwonline.co.za
- Make sure you familiarise yourself with how government procures goods and services. Visit the tender website for more information on how to tender.
- If you are uncomfortable about the request received, consider visiting the government department and/or the place of delivery and/or the service provider from whom you will be sourcing the goods.
- In the unlikely event that you are asked for a deposit to make a bid, contact the SCM unit of the department in question to ask whether this is in fact correct.

EXTRAORDINARY GAZETTES

3. Extraordinary Gazettes can have only one publication date. If multiple publications of an Extraordinary Gazette are required, a separate Z95/Z95Prov Adobe Forms for each publication date must be submitted.

Notice Submission Process

- 4. Download the latest *Adobe* form, for the relevant notice to be placed, from the **Government Printing Works** website <u>www.qpwonline.co.za</u>.
- 5. The Adobe form needs to be completed electronically using Adobe Acrobat / Acrobat Reader. Only electronically completed Adobe forms will be accepted. No printed, handwritten and/or scanned Adobe forms will be accepted.
- 6. The completed electronic *Adobe* form has to be submitted via email to submit.egazette@gpw.gov.za. The form needs to be submitted in its original electronic *Adobe* format to enable the system to extract the completed information from the form for placement in the publication.
- Every notice submitted must be accompanied by an official GPW quotation. This must be obtained from the eGazette Contact Centre.
- 8. Each notice submission should be sent as a single email. The email **must** contain **all documentation** relating to a particular notice submission.
 - 8.1. Each of the following documents must be attached to the email as a separate attachment:
 - 8.1.1. An electronically completed Adobe form, specific to the type of notice that is to be placed.
 - 8.1.1.1. For National *Government Gazette* or *Provincial Gazette* notices, the notices must be accompanied by an electronic Z95 or Z95Prov *Adobe* form
 - 8.1.1.2. The notice content (body copy) **MUST** be a separate attachment.
 - 8.1.2. A copy of the official **Government Printing Works** quotation you received for your notice. (Please see Quotation section below for further details)
 - 8.1.3. A valid and legible Proof of Payment / Purchase Order: **Government Printing Works** account customer must include a copy of their Purchase Order. **Non-Government Printing Works** account customer needs to submit the proof of payment for the notice
 - 8.1.4. Where separate notice content is applicable (Z95, Z95 Prov and TForm 3, it should **also** be attached as a separate attachment. (*Please see the Copy Section below, for the specifications*).
 - 8.1.5. Any additional notice information if applicable.

- 9. The electronic *Adobe* form will be taken as the primary source for the notice information to be published. Instructions that are on the email body or covering letter that contradicts the notice form content will not be considered. The information submitted on the electronic *Adobe* form will be published as-is.
- To avoid duplicated publication of the same notice and double billing, Please submit your notice ONLY ONCE.
- 11. Notices brought to **GPW** by "walk-in" customers on electronic media can only be submitted in *Adobe* electronic form format. All "walk-in" customers with notices that are not on electronic *Adobe* forms will be routed to the Contact Centre where they will be assisted to complete the forms in the required format.
- 12. Should a customer submit a bulk submission of hard copy notices delivered by a messenger on behalf of any organisation e.g. newspaper publisher, the messenger will be referred back to the sender as the submission does not adhere to the submission rules.

QUOTATIONS

- 13. Quotations are valid until the next tariff change.
 - 13.1. Take note: GPW's annual tariff increase takes place on 1 April therefore any quotations issued, accepted and submitted for publication up to 31 March will keep the old tariff. For notices to be published from 1 April, a quotation must be obtained from GPW with the new tariffs. Where a tariff increase is implemented during the year, GPW endeavours to provide customers with 30 days' notice of such changes.
- 14. Each quotation has a unique number.
- 15. Form Content notices must be emailed to the eGazette Contact Centre for a quotation.
 - 15.1. The *Adobe* form supplied is uploaded by the Contact Centre Agent and the system automatically calculates the cost of your notice based on the layout/format of the content supplied.
 - 15.2. It is critical that these *Adobe* Forms are completed correctly and adhere to the guidelines as stipulated by **GPW**.

16. APPLICABLE ONLY TO GPW ACCOUNT HOLDERS:

- 16.1. GPW Account Customers must provide a valid GPW account number to obtain a quotation.
- 16.2. Accounts for GPW account customers must be active with sufficient credit to transact with GPW to submit notices.

17. APPLICABLE ONLY TO CASH CUSTOMERS:

- 17.1. Cash customers doing **bulk payments** must use a **single email address** in order to use the **same proof of payment** for submitting multiple notices.
- 18. The responsibility lies with you, the customer, to ensure that the payment made for your notice(s) to be published is sufficient to cover the cost of the notice(s).
- 19. Each quotation will be associated with one proof of payment / purchase order / cash receipt.

- 20. Where the copy is part of a separate attachment document for Z95, Z95Prov and TForm03
 - 20.1. Copy of notices must be supplied in a separate document and may not constitute part of any covering letter, purchase order, proof of payment or other attached documents.

The content document should contain only one notice. (You may include the different translations of the same notice in the same document).

20.2. The notice should be set on an A4 page, with margins and fonts set as follows:

Page size = A4 Portrait with page margins: Top = 40mm, LH/RH = 16mm, Bottom = 40mm; Use font size: Arial or Helvetica 10pt with 11pt line spacing;

Page size = A4 Landscape with page margins: Top = 16mm, LH/RH = 40mm, Bottom = 16mm; Use font size: Arial or Helvetica 10pt with 11pt line spacing;

CANCELLATIONS

- 21. Cancellation of notice submissions are accepted by GPW according to the deadlines stated in the table above in point 2. Non-compliance to these deadlines will result in your request being failed. Please pay special attention to the different deadlines for each gazette. Please note that any notices cancelled after the cancellation deadline will be published and charged at full cost.
- 22. Requests for cancellation must be sent by the original sender of the notice and must accompanied by the relevant notice reference number (N-) in the email body.

AMENDMENTS TO NOTICES

NOTICE

SCHEDULE 1

1. Introduction

1.1 The Films and Publication Board (FPB) is a regulator established in terms of the THE FILMS AND PUBLICATIONS ACT, 1996, (ACT NO. 65 OF 1996) AS AMENDED by Act NO.11 of 2019, to protect the public against what is defined in the act as harmful and prohibited content.

Definitions:

- 1.1.1 "harmful" means causing emotional, psychological or moral distress to a person, whether it be through a film, game or publication through any on or offline medium, including through the internet and "harm" has the corresponding meaning;
- 1.1.2 disinformation" whereas it is not defined in terms of this Act, "disinformation" means information that is false, but the person who disseminates it knows it is false:
- 1.1.3 "misinformation" whereas it is not defined in terms of this Act, misinformation means information that is false, but the person who disseminates it believes it to be true:"
- 1.1.4 "prohibited content" means content which amounts to propaganda for war, incitement of imminent violence, advocacy of hatred that is based on an identifiable group characteristic, and that constitutes incitement to cause harm, or is prohibited in sections 16 (2), 16 (4) and 18 (3);
- 1.1.5 "Republic" means the republic of South Africa;

2. Background on disinformation and misinformation through social media during elections

- 2.1. In its Global Risk Report 2024, the World Economic Forum (WEF), has identified Misinformation and disinformation as the most emerging severe global risk anticipated over the next two years, to further widen societal and political divides. Not only does this underline the severity of misinformation and disinformation as a risk to the election process, the timeframes predicted confirms its imminence, and therefore it is an existential threat.
- 2.2. As South Africa join other 70 odd countries conducting their national elections in 2024, it is important that regulatory measures are put in place to ensure that the democratic will of the people is not undermined by acts of misinformation and disinformation.
- 2.3. During elections, misinformation, disinformation and fake news can be weaponized to:
 - Propagate for war;
 - incite imminent violence;
 - Spread hatred that is based on an identifiable group characteristic;
 - Cause harm.
- 2.4. Pursuant to section 31 (3) (a), the FPB has, taking into account the provisions of section 18H of the FP Act, identified misinformation/disinformation and fake news, as harmful or disturbing, due to its potential to propagate for war, incite violence, or advocate hate speech. Such material is therefore prohibited in terms of the Act.

SCHEDULE 2

PROHIBITION AGAINST PROPAGANDA FOR WAR; INCITEMENT OF IMMINENT VIOLENCE AND ADVOCACY OF HATRED THAT IS BASED ON IDENTIFIABLE GROUP CHARACTERISTICS, AND THAT CONSTITUTES INCITEMENT TO CAUSE HARM IN TERMS OF SECTION 18H OF THE FILMS AND PUBLICATIONS ACT, 2019

- 3. Prohibition against propaganda for war; incitement of imminent violence and advocacy of hatred that is based on identifiable group characteristics, and that constitutes incitement to cause harm (1) No person may distribute through any medium including the internet and social media, any film, game or publication which amounts to propaganda for war, incites imminent violence or advocates hate speech.
- **4. Offence and liability for non-compliance.** (1) Any person who knowingly distribute through any medium including the internet and social media, any film, game or publication which amounts to propaganda for war, incites imminent violence or advocates hate speech shall be guilty of an offence and liable, upon conviction, to a fine not exceeding R150,000.00 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding two years or to both a fine and such imprisonment.
- **5. Powers and duties of the Enforcement Committee** (1) The Enforcement Committee shall adjudicate all cases and make appropriate findings, after the Board and the responded have been heard or granted a reasonable opportunity to be heard;
 - (2) Where appropriate
 - (a) impose a fine;
 - (b) as prescribed, suspend a registration certificate; or
 - (c) through the Board, refer the matter to the National Director of Public Prosecutions for prosecuting and, in such a case, the Enforcement Committee shall not make a finding.

SCHEDULE 3

OBLIGATIONS OF INTERNET SERVICE PROVIDERS.

- 6. Knowledge of the use of services of an internet service provider. Where an internet access provider has knowledge that its services have been used for the hosting or distribution of content that amount to propaganda for war, incitement of imminent violence or advocating hatred based on an identifiable group characteristic and that constitutes incitement to cause harm, such internet service provider shall report to the FPB in writing, within 30 (thirty) days from publication of this Notice -
 - (a) All reasonable measures available on their platforms to prevent prohibited content ahead of and during the 2024 National and Provincial Elections, in particular misinformation, disinformation and fake news.
 - (b) All reasonable steps taken to prevent access to content which amounts to propaganda for war, incitement of imminent violence, advocacy of hatred that is based on an identifiable group characteristic, and that constitutes incitement to cause harm such as misinformation and disinformation ahead of and during the 2024 National and Provincial Elections.

7. Offence and liability for non-compliance. – (1) Any person who —

- (a) fails to comply with section 27A (1) and (2) of the Act shall be guilty of an offence and liable, upon conviction, to a fine not exceeding R150,000.00 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months or to both a fine and such imprisonment; or
- (b) fails to comply with section 27A (2) or (3) shall be guilty of an offence and liable, upon conviction, to a fine not exceeding R750,000.00 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding five years or to both a fine and such imprisonment.

8. OBLIGATION TO REPORT ON AVAILABLE REASONABLE MEASURES TO PREVENT PROHIBITED CONTENT AHEAD OF AND DURING THE 2024 NATIONAL AND PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS IN THE REPUBLIC

- (a) Internet Service Providers, user-to-user services including Social Media and Video Sharing platforms and search engines have a responsibility ahead of and during the 2024 National and Provincial Elections to ensure that their platforms are not used for propaganda for war; incitement of imminent violence and advocacy of hatred that is based on identifiable group characteristics, and that constitutes incitement to cause harm in terms of section 18H of the Act. It is therefore expected that sufficient measures should be made available to ensure compliance with the provisions of section 18H of the Act.
- (b) Platforms outlined in paragraph 8(a) above are required to report to the FPB in writing, within 30 (thirty) days from publication of this Notice
 - (1) What reasonable measures have they put in place to prevent prohibited content ahead of and during 2024 National Elections in the Republic; and
 - (2) All reasonable steps taken to prevent access and/or distribution of content which amounts to propaganda for war, incitement of imminent violence, advocacy of hatred that is based on an identifiable group characteristic, and that constitutes incitement to cause harm such as misinformation and disinformation during election.

DRAFT SOUTH AFRICAN WATER QUALITY GUIDELINES FOR COASTAL MARINE WATERS – VOLUME 1: NATURAL ENVIRONMENT AND MARICULTURE USE

I, Barbara Dallas Creecy, Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment, hereby publish for public comment, the South African Water Quality Guidelines for Coastal Marine Waters – Volume 1: Natural Environment and Mariculture Use in terms of sections 83(1)(f)(v), (ix) and (xiii) of the National Environmental Management: Integrated Coastal Management Act, 2008 (Act No. 24 of 2008).

The document can be obtained by email and download from the Department's website, and a hard-copy accessed at the Department's offices. The details are provided below.

The primary purpose of the draft guidelines is to set the baseline standards of quality for different marine environments. The draft guidelines will replace the standards set in the older guidelines previously developed by the then national Department of Water Affairs and Forestry where a set of four Water Quality Guidelines were developed in 1992, and updated in 1995, which were aimed at managing coastal and marine water quality for designated uses.

Members of the public are invited to submit comments on the draft guidelines to the Minister within 30 (thirty) days of the publication of this notice in the *Gazette* or the newspaper, whichever date is last. FINANCIAL SECTOR REGULATION ACT, 2017:

DEPOSIT INSURANCE REGULATIONS

The Minister of Finance, in terms of sections 288(1) and 166AB(1)(b) of the Financial Sector Regulation Act, 2017 (Act No. 9 of 2017), has made the regulations contained in the Schedule.

SCHEDULE

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CHAPTER I

DEFINITIONS AND PURPOSE

Definitions

1. In these regulations, any word or expression to which a meaning has been assigned in section 1(1) of the Act, must bear that meaning, unless the context indicates otherwise, and—

'accountable institution' means an accountable institution as defined in section 1(1) of the Financial Intelligence Centre Act;

'beneficiary' means the person who is legally entitled to, or owns, a part of or all of the funds in a formal beneficiary account even if the account is not in that person's name;

'board' means the board of directors of a bank:

'chief executive officer' has the meaning defined in section 1(1) of the Banks Act;

'co-operative bank' has the meaning defined in section 1(1) of the Co-operative Banks Act, 2007 (Act No. 40 of 2007);

'co-operative financial institution' has the meaning defined in section 1(1) of the Co-operative Banks Act, 2007 (Act No. 40 of 2007);

'constitution document' means a document which describes the purpose and functioning of an informal savings group, specifies who the signatories are, and set out the rules for the contribution and distribution of funds from and to members;

'depositor protection' means the protections afforded by the Corporation in accordance with Chapter 12A of the Act;

'director' has the meaning defined in section 1(1) the Banks Act;

'electronic money product' means a product offered by a bank, which-

- (a) represents monetary value and must be claimable by an issuer;
- (b) can be stored electronically and issued on receipt of funds;
- (c) is generally accepted as a means of payment by persons other than the issuer; and
- (d) is redeemable on demand for physical cash or a deposit into a bank account;

'financial contribution' includes—

- (a) a deposit insurance levy imposed under section 9 of the Financial Sector and Deposit Insurance Levies Act, 2022 (Act No. 11 of 2022); and
- (b) a deposit insurance premium imposed in accordance with section 166BG of the Act;

'formal address' means a structured description of an address with a minimum of a street name, town or city, postal code and country and optional information about a building name, building number and street number;

'formal beneficiary account' means an account in a qualifying product where the account holder may not be the owner of the funds in the account but manages the funds on behalf of the beneficiaries to the account, subject to the following conditions:

- (a) The account holder is an accountable institution managing funds on behalf of one or more beneficiaries by maintaining formal records of beneficiaries and their associated balances; or
- (b) a bank as the accountable institution maintains formal records of the beneficiaries and their associated balances in an account where the account holder is not an accountable institution but manages funds on behalf of one or more beneficiaries;

'fund liquidity contribution' means the minimum amount maintained by a bank in the account of the Fund in accordance with section 166BH of the Act and any adjustments to the minimum amount;

'indicator' means a marking that provides information about the status of a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, signatory, or account;

'informal address' means a free-form description of an address with optional street or landmark information, but with a minimum of town or city, postal code and country;

'informal beneficiary account' means an account offered by a bank to an informal beneficiary account holder who is not an accountable institution and whose members elect signatories to manage the account on their behalf in accordance with the rules specified in the constitution document:

'informal beneficiary account holder' means an informal group established by individuals as members to collectively save for a purpose specified in a constitution document;

'interest accrued' means interest earned, as at a specific date, not yet added to the account balance:

'internal audit function' refers to a bank's internal audit function or a person responsible for the internal controls at a bank;

'joint account' means a simple account opened in the name of two or more account holders;

'key systems' means any information technology system or manual process which affects, stores or processes data required by the Corporation;

'mutual bank' has the meaning as defined in section 1(1) of the Mutual Banks Act, 1993 (Act No. 124 of 1993);

'not-ready-for-payout (NRP)' means that a bank has marked a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, signatory, or account with one or more indicators reflecting the need for additional documentation or actions before the Corporation can reimburse a qualifying depositor;

'payout agent bank' means a bank, other than a bank in resolution, authorised by the Corporation to reimburse, on its behalf, a qualifying depositor of a bank in resolution in respect of their covered deposits;

'qualifying balance' means the balance due to a qualifying depositor or formal beneficiary account holder for an account:

'qualifying deposit balance' means a formal beneficiary account holder's qualifying balance or the sum of a qualifying depositor's qualifying balances;

'qualifying depositor' includes—

- (a) an account holder of a simple account;
- (b) a beneficiary of a formal beneficiary account; and
- (c) an informal beneficiary account holder,

that holds a qualifying product;

'qualifying product' means a qualifying deposit, regardless of its term or currency, and does not include—

- (a) a share;
- (b) holdings in commodities;
- (c) an electronic money product;
- (d) a suspense account; and
- (e) any product where the principal amount is not repayable at par or is repayable at par only subject to a specific condition or guarantee;

'ready-for-payout (RFP)' means that a bank has marked a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, signatory, or account with an indicator reflecting that the Corporation can reimburse a qualifying depositor;

'reimbursement' means the transfer of the amount of covered deposits to an account in the name of a qualifying depositor or giving a qualifying depositor access to their covered deposits by other means;

'reporting date' means the date on which the information for the preparation of a single customer view calculation is based;

'signatory' means an individual who has been appointed by the members of an informal beneficiary account holder to manage an informal beneficiary account on their behalf;

'simple account' means an account where the account holder is the legal owner of the funds in the account;

'single customer view (SCV) calculation' means the calculation of a bank's total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits based on the single customer view (SCV) records of its qualifying depositors and a record of each formal beneficiary account for which a bank cannot generate an SCV record for the beneficiaries;

'single customer view (SCV) record' means a consolidated view of a qualifying depositor's accounts and associated balances in qualifying products for purposes of calculating the qualifying depositor's qualifying deposit balance and covered deposits;

'sole proprietorship' means a business that is owned and operated by a natural person that does not have legal personality separate from its owner;

'suspense account' means an account where funds are held temporarily until the funds are processed and allocated to a specific account holder;

"the Act" means the Financial Sector Regulation Act, 2017 (Act No. 9 of 2017);

'transaction effective date' means the date on which the Prudential Authority registers the notices of the passing of a resolution confirming any amalgamation or merger in terms of section 54(5) of the Banks Act;

'total covered deposits' means the total of all covered deposits at a bank; and

'total qualifying deposits' means the total of all qualifying deposit balances at a bank.

Purpose

2. The purpose of these regulations is to provide for procedural and administrative matters necessary to effectively operate the Corporation and the Fund.

CHAPTER II

COVERAGE

Limit of cover for covered deposits

3. (1) For the purposes of section 166AB(1) of the Act, the maximum amount the Corporation may apply from the Fund in respect of a qualifying depositor of a bank in resolution for their qualifying deposit balance is R100 000 (one hundred thousand Rand).

(2) The coverage applies to a bank's operations conducted in the Republic.

Coverage rules

- **4.** (1) The Corporation must cover a sole proprietor as a separate qualifying depositor.
- (2) The Corporation must cover an informal beneficiary account holder as a formal beneficiary account when a bank—
- (a) collects and maintains the constitution document of an informal beneficiary account;
- (b) can identify and record the members and their entitlement balances for a reporting date in terms of the constitution document for an informal beneficiary account; and
- (c) reports the account as a formal beneficiary account to the Corporation.
- (3) The Corporation must cover a co-operative financial institution as an informal beneficiary account holder.
 - (4) The Corporation must—
- (a) cover a qualifying depositor's share in a joint account according to the sharing ratio specified by the account holders in the records of the bank; or
- (b) if the account holders did not specify a sharing ratio in the records of the bank, cover a qualifying depositor's share in a joint account by dividing the account balance equally between the account holders.
- (5) If a bank is a party to an amalgamation or merger transaction as contemplated in section 54 of the Banks Act, the Corporation must cover a qualifying depositor of an affected bank for their covered deposits held at the bank for as long as the bank remains a member of the Corporation.
- (6) For the purposes of subregulation (5), the Corporation must cover a qualifying depositor of an affected bank as follows:
- (a) Prior to the transaction effective date, the Corporation must cover a qualifying depositor of each affected bank for their covered deposits; or
- (b) after the transaction effective date, the Corporation must cover a qualifying depositor of the amalgamated or combined bank for their covered deposits.

Review of limit and scope of coverage

5. The Corporation may review the limit of cover and scope of depositor protection at least every five years from the date of its establishment.

CHAPTER III

APPLICATION OF FUND WHEN REIMBURSING COVERED DEPOSITS IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 166AA(1)(b) OF ACT

Reimbursement of covered deposits

- **6.** (1) The Corporation must apply the Fund to reimburse a qualifying depositor of a bank in resolution for their covered deposits when the following conditions are fulfilled:
- (a) the bank is a member of the Corporation; and
- (b) the Reserve Bank has decided that covered deposits must be reimbursed.
- (2) The Corporation must reimburse a qualifying depositor of a bank for their covered deposits not later than 20 calendar days from the date on which the conditions specified under subregulation (1) are fulfilled, except in the cases specified in regulation 10.
- (3) When the conditions specified under subregulation (1) are fulfilled, the Corporation must publicly announce the reimbursement of covered deposits, its commencement date, the reimbursement methods, and the end of the reimbursement process.

Reimbursement methods

- **7.** (1) The Corporation must use the information submitted by a bank in resolution in accordance with regulation 30 to determine the covered deposits for a qualifying depositor using the rules specified in these regulations.
- (2) The Corporation may reimburse a qualifying depositor for their covered deposits using any method it deems appropriate, including—
- (a) making an electronic funds transfer into an account nominated by a qualifying depositor, in the name of a qualifying depositor at a bank other than the bank in resolution; or
- (b) through one or more payout agent banks.
- (3) The Corporation may make multiple reimbursements to a qualifying depositor, subject to the limit of cover.

(4) Reimbursement of a qualifying depositor's covered deposits by the Corporation discharges the Corporation from all liabilities to the qualifying depositor for the reimbursed amount.

Reimbursement of formal beneficiary account

8. The Corporation must reimburse a beneficiary of a formal beneficiary account for their covered deposits not later than 20 calendar days from receipt of the information referred to in regulation 31.

Reimbursement of informal beneficiary account

- **9.** (1) The Corporation must reimburse the signatories to the account for the informal beneficiary account holder's covered deposits.
- (2) The Corporation must reimburse a signatory of an informal beneficiary account in line with their rights and responsibilities as specified in the records of the bank in resolution.
- (3) If an informal beneficiary account holder has multiple accounts with different signatories, the Corporation may reimburse each set of signatories for the covered deposits on a *pro rata* basis.

Right of Corporation to defer reimbursement of covered deposits

- **10.** (1) The Corporation may extend the period for reimbursement specified under regulation 6(2)—
- (a) when a bank, in the information submitted to the Corporation in accordance with these regulations, indicates that—
 - a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, or signatory has not been reliably identified in accordance with the requirements of the Financial Intelligence Centre Act;
 - (ii) the legal right of a qualifying depositor or signatory to receive a reimbursement is not established, or a covered deposit is the subject of a legal dispute;
 - (iii) a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, signatory, or an account is subject to restrictive measures imposed by the local authorities or international organisations;

- (iv) a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, or signatory has been charged with an offence arising out of or in relation to money laundering as defined in the Financial Intelligence Centre Act or any other financial crime;
- (v) an account is pledged for any purpose at the bank, for the same or a different person,
 or at another bank for the same or different person; or
- (vi) a qualifying depositor or a formal beneficiary account holder is deceased;
- (b) in other reasonable circumstances determined by the Corporation.
- (2) The Corporation must reimburse a qualifying depositor for a deferred covered deposit within 20 calendar days after the reason for the deferral has been resolved and the Corporation has been duly notified.

Currency of reimbursement

- **11.** (1) The Corporation must reimburse a covered deposit in South African Rand.
- (2) For purposes of subregulation (1), a bank in resolution must convert a foreign currency balance to South African Rand using close of business market exchange rates at the date the Minister made a determination placing the bank in resolution in accordance with section 166J(2) of the Act.
- (3) If the date on which a bank is placed in resolution, referred to in subregulation (2), falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or a public holiday, the bank in resolution must convert a foreign currency balance to South African Rand using the rate published by the Reserve Bank on the immediately preceding business day.

Statements to qualifying depositors

- **12.** The Corporation—
- (a) must make a statement available to a qualifying depositor of a bank in resolution after each reimbursement to them, or when it defers the reimbursement of their covered deposits in accordance with regulation 10;
- (b) must notify a qualifying depositor of the availability of a statement to them using any method it deems appropriate, including SMS or e-mail; and
- (c) may make a statement available to a qualifying depositor using any method it deems appropriate.

Unpaid covered deposits

13. A qualifying depositor can claim their covered deposits from the Corporation within a period of three years from the date the circumstances in regulation 6(1) occurred.

Disputes against Corporation

- **14.** (1) A qualifying depositor who disagrees with a reimbursed amount may file a dispute with the Corporation within three months from the date of reimbursement of their covered deposits.
- (2) A person claiming to be a qualifying depositor, who has not received any reimbursement, may file a dispute with the Corporation within the period specified in regulation 13.
- (3) A qualifying depositor or person referred to in subregulation (2) must submit a dispute in the manner and the form prescribed by the Corporation.
- (4) Upon receipt of a dispute, the Corporation must investigate the dispute and decide on the dispute submitted in terms of subregulation (1) or (2) within 20 calendar days from receipt of the dispute.
- (5) When considering a dispute, the Corporation may request additional evidence supporting the claim.
- (6) If the Corporation requests additional evidence supporting a qualifying depositor or person's claim, the Corporation must pronounce on the dispute within 20 calendar days from the receipt of the additional evidence by the Corporation.
- (7) If a dispute resulted in an amount due to a qualifying depositor or person, the Corporation must—
- (a) subject to the limit of cover, reimburse the qualifying depositor or person within 20 calendar days after the pronouncement in accordance with subregulation (4) or subregulation (6) using the reimbursement methods specified in regulation 7; and
- (b) make an updated statement available to the qualifying depositor or person in accordance with regulation 12.

Selection of payout agent bank

15. When selecting a payout agent bank, the Corporation must use a fair and transparent process.

Exchange of information

- **16.** (1) The Corporation must regularly inform the liquidator or resolution practitioner of a bank in resolution about amounts reimbursed to an individual qualifying depositor.
- (2) The Corporation may request information from the liquidator or resolution practitioner of a bank in resolution for the purposes of a reimbursement or when considering a dispute submitted in accordance with regulation 14.
- (3) Unless expressly otherwise determined by the Corporation, the liquidator or resolution practitioner of a bank in resolution must furnish the Corporation with the requested information within 10 business days of receiving a request referred to in subregulation (2).

CHAPTER IV

APPLICATION OF FUND IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 166AA(1)(c) OF ACT

Conditions for use

- **17.** If a bank is in resolution, the Corporation must apply the Fund in accordance with section 166AA(1)(*c*) of the Act when the following conditions are fulfilled:
- (a) The bank is a member of the Corporation;
- (b) the Reserve Bank decides to enter into an agreement related to a transaction referred to in section 166S(1) of the Act, in relation to the total covered deposits of the bank in resolution;
- (c) the Reserve Bank formally requests support from the Corporation for a transaction referred to in section 166S(1) of the Act; and
- (d) the agreement related to a transaction referred to in section 166S(1) of the Act is finalised.

Determination of total covered deposits for non-payout resolution support

18. The Corporation must use the information submitted by a bank in resolution in accordance with regulation 30 to determine total covered deposits for the bank in resolution using the rules specified in these regulations.

CHAPTER V

GOVERNANCE AND OVERSIGHT REQUIREMENTS

Declaration when bank has no qualifying depositors

- **19.** (1) If a bank did not have qualifying depositors for a particular reporting date, it must submit to the Corporation, Declaration A1.
- (2) A bank's chief executive officer and chief financial officer, or equivalent, must sign Declaration A1.

Monthly declarations

- **20.** (1) Except in cases referred to in subregulation (2), a bank must submit Compliance declaration A2 to the Corporation within three working days of submitting its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits to the Corporation in accordance with regulation 28, confirming that the bank—
- (a) prepared and submitted the information in accordance with the requirements set out in these regulations;
- (b) maintained effective compliance and internal controls over the information reported in terms of the requirements set out in these regulations;
- (c) complies with the minimum requirements set out in these regulations; and
- (d) provided information to the Corporation that is true and correct.
- (2) If a bank does not comply with the minimum requirements set out in these regulations, the bank must submit Compliance declaration A3 to the Corporation within three working days of submitting its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits to the Corporation in accordance with regulation 28, which declaration must highlight specific areas of non-compliance, together with—
- (a) the reasons for the non-compliance; and
- (b) a remedial plan with actions that the bank will take to address its non-compliance and associated timelines.
- (3) If a bank previously reported areas of non-compliance to the Corporation in Compliance declaration A3, a bank must submit an update to the Corporation on the progress made

with its plan to address those areas of non-compliance together with Compliance declaration A3 for the current month.

- (4) A bank's chief executive officer and chief financial officer, or equivalent, must sign Compliance declaration A2 and Compliance declaration A3, respectively.
- (5) The submission of the declarations mentioned in subregulations (1) and (2) may not preclude the Corporation from requiring amendments to the remedial plan or requiring the immediate remediation of the reported non-compliance.

Changes to key systems used for reporting to Corporation

21. A bank must ensure that the implementation of any changes to its key systems used for reporting to the Corporation does not jeopardize the accuracy and completeness of the information submitted to the Corporation.

Internal audit requirements

- **22.** (1) A bank, as a minimum, must have the following controls in place:
- (a) all affected business units, including a bank's internal audit function, must have embedded internal procedures in their normal conduct of business to comply with the Corporation's requirements for the calculation and submission of a bank's total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits as specified in these regulations;
- (b) the internal procedures must allow business units to identify and address data inaccuracies and exceptions quickly and adequately to avoid errors; and
- (c) a bank must document its internal procedures and controls for complying with the Corporation's requirements, and such documentation must—
 - cover the process a bank uses to collect, process, and compile its SCV records and SCV calculations; and
 - (ii) identify areas where the bank can improve the effectiveness of its controls.
- (2) A bank must, on an ongoing basis, review and keep up to date the documentation referred to in subregulation (1)(c) and submit the documentation to the Corporation upon request.
 - (3) A bank's internal audit function must—

- (a) continuously monitor and assess the reliability of a bank's internal controls in terms of the preparation of the bank's total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits using SCV calculations; and
- (b) report on the outcome of its assessment in accordance with paragraph (a) to the Corporation and the Prudential Authority within the last quarter of the bank's financial year.

CHAPTER VI

PUBLIC AWARENESS

Depositor protection information

- **23.** The Corporation must develop and publish through any channel it deems appropriate, the following information—
- (a) details of the protections afforded by the Corporation;
- (b) the process and conditions for reimbursement conducted in accordance with section 166AA(1)(b) of the Act; and
- (c) information on its operations.

Corporation's provision of depositor protection information to banks

- **24.** The Corporation must make available to a bank—
- (a) deposit insurance information for distribution to its depositors;
- (b) standardised material to communicate its membership of the Corporation to its depositors; and
- (c) training or training materials on depositor protection.

Type and contents of depositor protection information that must be provided by banks

- **25.** (1) A bank must make information about depositor protection readily available and visible to depositors.
- (2) When informing a depositor about depositor protection and in advertising materials, a bank must—
- (a) make true, correct, and complete representations with respect to—
 - (i) what constitutes a qualifying depositor;

- (ii) whether a product qualifies for depositor protection;
- (iii) the limit of cover applicable to depositor protection as specified in these regulations; and
- (iv) its membership to the Corporation; and
- (b) only use standardised material approved by the Corporation.
- (3) A bank must state in the terms and conditions of a product whether the depositor and product qualifies for depositor protection.
- (4) A bank must ensure that its customer-facing staff undergo depositor protection training annually using the training or training material made available by the Corporation in accordance with regulation 24(c).

Depositor awareness of mergers and amalgamations or transfer or sale of deposit books

- **26.** (1) If a bank is a party to an amalgamation or merger transaction as contemplated in section 54 of the Banks Act, or where a bank's deposit book is transferred to another bank, the affected bank must notify its depositors at least 30 days before the transaction effective date or, where applicable, as soon as possible after the bank is required to announce information relating to the transaction through a Stock Exchange News Service.
- (2) If the Resolution Authority facilitates a transaction referred to in subregulation(1) the prescribed notification period does not apply.
- (3) A bank must give a qualifying depositor a period of 90 days following notification in accordance with subregulation (1) to withdraw or transfer their qualifying product or any part of the product to another bank without incurring any costs.

CHAPTER VII REPORTING

SCV reporting requirements

- **27.** (1) A bank must prepare its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits using SCV calculations.
- (2) The Corporation may provide additional guidelines for the preparation of total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits by a bank in accordance with these regulations.
- (3) To prepare its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits using SCV calculations, a bank must ensure that it's key systems, at a minimum, are able to—

- (a) identify a qualifying deposit;
- (b) identify an account held in a qualifying product;
- (c) identify a qualifying depositor, signatory and a formal beneficiary account holder using the minimum identification criteria set out in these regulations;
- (d) identify a simple account, formal beneficiary account or informal beneficiary account;
- (e) mark a qualifying depositor, signatory, formal beneficiary account holder, and an account in a qualifying product as ready-for-payout (RFP) or not-ready-for-payout (NRP) using one or more of the applicable indicators;
- (f) provide the details of an account held in a qualifying product with its balances;
- (g) provide a balance due to a beneficiary of a formal beneficiary account;
- (h) calculate the interest accrued on an account daily, to include interest as at the reporting date;
- (i) convert a foreign currency balance to South African Rand as at the reporting date;
- (j) generate a SCV record with the required information fields for each qualifying depositor and their accounts in a qualifying product; and
- (k) generate a separate record for each formal beneficiary account for which a bank cannot generate a SCV record for the beneficiaries.

Submission to Corporation

- **28.** (1) A bank must submit its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits to the Corporation monthly, using month-end balances, in the manner and form prescribed by the Corporation.
- (2) A bank must submit its supporting SCV calculations with the total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits to the Corporation quarterly or at a frequency specified by the Corporation, in the manner and form prescribed by the Corporation.

Ad hoc submissions

- **29.** (1) The Corporation may request a bank to submit *ad hoc* total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits, with the supporting SCV calculations.
- (2) A bank must provide the Corporation with the information requested in terms of subregulation (1), within 48 hours of receiving an *ad hoc* request from the Corporation, using the reporting date specified by the Corporation, in the manner and form prescribed by the Corporation.

Submission by bank in resolution

- **30.** (1) A bank must provide the Corporation with its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits, with the supporting SCV calculations, within 48 hours from the date the bank is placed in resolution.
- (2) The total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits, with the supporting SCV calculations, must contain the balances of qualifying products due to qualifying depositor or formal beneficiary account holder as at the date the bank was placed in resolution.
- (3) If a bank fails to provide the Corporation with total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits, together with the supporting SCV calculations, in accordance with subregulation (1), the resolution practitioner or liquidator must provide the Corporation with the bank's total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits with the supporting SCV calculations.
- (4) Any subsequent amendment to the total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits and the supporting SCV calculations, submitted to the Corporation in accordance with subregulation (1), must be signed and submitted to the Corporation by the resolution practitioner or liquidator of the bank in resolution.

Details of beneficiary of formal beneficiary account of bank in resolution

- **31.** (1) A formal beneficiary account holder must identify a beneficiary of a formal beneficiary account using the minimum identification criteria, specified in regulation 37(1), and submit the details of the beneficiary, specified in regulation 35(4), to the bank in resolution.
- (2) A bank in resolution must submit the details, specified in regulation 35(4), of a beneficiary of a formal beneficiary account to the Corporation.

Validation or verification of SCV calculations

- **32.** (1) The Corporation must perform a validation or verification of a bank's SCV calculations.
- (2) If the Corporation informs a bank of any errors or discrepancies identified in the bank's SCV calculations, the bank must correct and resubmit its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits, with the supporting SCV calculations, to the Corporation within 48 hours or a timeframe specified by the Corporation.

Adjustments to financial contribution and fund liquidity contribution

33. If a resubmission referred to in regulation 32(2) results in an amendment to a bank's total covered deposits, the Corporation may decide whether the bank must adjust its financial contribution or fund liquidity contribution to the Corporation accordingly.

SCV reporting of depositor information to Corporation

- **34.** (1) Except in circumstances referred to in regulation 35, a bank must include in its SCV calculations qualifying depositor information for the following accounts, as applicable to the bank—
- (a) simple accounts;
- (b) formal beneficiary accounts; and
- (c) informal beneficiary accounts.
 - (2) For the accounts referred to in subregulation (1), a bank must—
- (a) include dormant accounts; and
- (b) apply the coverage rules in accordance with these regulations.
- (3) A bank must include the details specified by the Corporation for each account referred to in subregulation (1) when generating its SCV records and submit to the Corporation in the manner and form prescribed by the Corporation.
- (4) A bank must differentiate between a qualifying depositor that is a natural person and a sole proprietor and include them as separate qualifying depositors in its SCV records.
- (5) A bank must include each formal beneficiary account in its SCV calculations except when, on a monthly basis—
- (a) a bank can identify every beneficiary to a formal beneficiary account and not one of the beneficiaries is a qualifying depositor; or
- (b) a bank, based on information received from the holder of a formal beneficiary account, confirms that not one of the beneficiaries to a formal beneficiary account is a qualifying depositor.
- (6) A bank must report a co-operative financial institution as an informal beneficiary account holder.
 - (7) If a bank—
- (a) collects and maintains the constitution document; and

(b) identifies and records details of the members and the balances due to each member for a reporting date in terms of the constitution document,

for an informal beneficiary account holder, the bank must treat the account as a formal beneficiary account.

Reporting of formal beneficiary account when SCV reporting is not possible

- **35.** (1) If a bank cannot generate SCV records for the beneficiaries of a formal beneficiary account in accordance with regulation 34(1), the bank must include a separate record for each formal beneficiary account with their balances in the preparation of its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits calculations, except in the circumstances referred to in regulation 34(5).
- (2) In these regulations, any requirement relating to the preparation of SCV calculations and the submission of the SCV calculations to the Corporation, must include a requirement for the preparation and submission of the separate records for each formal beneficiary account for which a bank cannot generate an SCV record for the beneficiaries.
- (3) If a bank cannot identify all the beneficiaries of a formal beneficiary account with their balances in the account, it must include the formal beneficiary account's balance as the account's qualifying balance and covered deposits.
- (4) For the purposes of subregulation (3), a bank must include the details specified by the Corporation for each formal beneficiary account when generating its SCV calculations and submit them to the Corporation in the manner and form prescribed by the Corporation.

Use of total covered deposits

36. The Corporation must use a bank's monthly total covered deposits, submitted to it in accordance with regulation 28 and containing the information prescribed by the Corporation, to calculate the bank's financial contribution and fund liquidity contribution to the Corporation.

General reporting requirements

- **37.** (1) A bank, as a minimum identification criterion, must identify a qualifying depositor, signatory, and formal beneficiary account holder in terms of the requirements of the Financial Intelligence Centre Act.
 - (2) A bank must provide—

- (a) the identifying details specified by the Corporation of a qualifying depositor, signatory, or formal beneficiary account holder; and
- (b) at least the following contact details for a qualifying depositor, signatory, or formal beneficiary account holder—
 - (i) either a formal or informal address; and
 - (ii) one telephone number or an email address.
- (3) (a) Unless expressly otherwise determined by the Corporation, a bank must report balances to the Corporation—
 - (i) in South African Rand and up to two decimals cents of currency;
 - (ii) on a gross basis;
 - (iii) including interest accrued up to the reporting date; and
 - (iv) excluding outstanding account fees up to the reporting date.
- (b) A bank must include account balances as—
 - (i) a zero qualifying balance when it is a balance owed to the bank; or
 - (ii) the qualifying depositor's share in a joint account as the qualifying balance.
- (c) A bank must convert a foreign currency balance to South African Rand using close of business market exchange rates at the reporting date.
- (d) A bank must—
 - (i) include an unsettled payment made to the account balance; and
 - (ii) deduct an unsettled payment made from the account balance.
 - (4) A bank must use one or more not-ready-for-payout (NRP) indicators where—
- (a) a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, or signatory has not been reliably identified in accordance with the requirements of the Financial Intelligence Centre Act;
- (b) the legal right of a qualifying depositor or signatory to receive a reimbursement is not established, or a covered deposit is the subject of a legal dispute;
- (c) a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, signatory, or an account is subject to restrictive measures imposed by the local authorities or international organisations;
- (d) a qualifying depositor, formal beneficiary account holder, or signatory has been charged with an offence arising out of or in relation to money laundering as defined in the Financial Intelligence Centre Act or any other financial crime;

- (e) an account is pledged for any purpose at the bank, for the same or a different person, or at another bank for the same or different person;
- (f) a qualifying depositor or a formal beneficiary account holder is deceased; or
- (g) other cases determined by the Corporation.
 - (5) A bank must report on its operations in the Republic only.

CHAPTER VIII

MISCELLANEOUS

Failure or inability to comply

- **38.** (1) A bank that fails or is unable to comply with a provision of these regulations must report its failure or inability to comply in writing to the Corporation, stating the reasons for the failure or inability to comply.
- (2) The Corporation may, if in the circumstances the Corporation deems it fit to do so, condone the said failure or inability and, subject to such conditions as may be specified in writing, afford the bank concerned an opportunity to comply with the relevant provision within a specified period.
- (3) In performing its functions in terms of these regulations, the Corporation may in writing, exempt for a specified period which may be renewed, a bank or category of banks or all banks, from one or more requirements specified in these regulations, subject to conditions determined by the Corporation.
- (4) The Corporation may refer any failure or inability to comply with the provisions of these regulations to the Prudential Authority to take action against a bank referred to in subregulation (1) in accordance with the applicable financial sector law.

Reporting and submitting information to Corporation

- **39.** (1) The Corporation, by notice in the *Gazette*, may specify the form and content of reporting and submitting information in terms of these regulations.
- (2) A bank must report and submit information in accordance with the relevant forms contained in the notice.
- (3) Additional facilities may be provided by the Corporation for the submission by a bank of the required information by electronic means, and further details in this regard may be obtained from the Corporation.

Short title and commencement

40. These regulations are called the Deposit Insurance Regulations, 2024, and take effect 1 April 2024.

A. INTRODUCTION

Background

- 1. The fifty Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) Colleges became the national competency of the Department of Higher Education and Training (the Department) in 2015, as a result of the functional shift. TVET Colleges consist of various campuses, and the state of infrastructure differs depending on how the campus has been maintained. The TVET College sector has never received funding to expand and upgrade physical infrastructure maintenance and repairs to address backlogs inherited from past until April 2018. The funding of TVET Colleges' infrastructure has been part of the National Norms and Standards for Funding TVET Colleges (NNSF-TVET Colleges). The infrastructure funding model is meant to develop the National Norms and Standards for Infrastructure Funding (NNSIF) of TVET Colleges.
- 2. Minimum Norms and Standards define the essential infrastructure funding for provision and maintenance of TVET Colleges to meet the standard to appropriately become conducive learning institution (DHET, 2018). This is of great significance to South African students, regardless of race, gender, or class. They will be able to learn in environments with adequate infrastructure. Access to the TVET system will accelerate when the issues of spatial inequalities, expanded provisioning, and financial constraints are addressed.

The purpose of the policy

3. The National Norms and Standards for Infrastructure Funding (NNSIF) is guided infrastructure provisioning norms and standards in public Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) colleges developed by the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET). This funding is directed to immovable infrastructure assets, furtniture and equipment to operationalise new buildings, Information Communication Training (ICT) upgrades as well as intangible assets such as installations for WIFI connectivity. Furthermore, the policy seeks to provide guidelines and uniformity by DHET to allocate infrastructure funds allocated by the National Treasury to TVET Colleges.

- 4. This policy is established subject to the requirement of the following legislation:
 - a. Section 22 (3) of the Continuing Education and Training Act (CET) Act, 2006 (Act 16 of 2006) requires the Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Innovation to determine further appropriate measures for the redress of past inequalities.
 - b. Section 23 of the CET Act, 2006 (Act 16 of 2006) requires that the Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Innovation, after consultation with the Minister of Finance, determine the norms and standards for funding public education and training colleges.
- This policy is supported by the National Norms and Standards for Funding (NNSF)-TVET Colleges as follows:
 - 5.1 Paragraph 61 of the NNSF-TVET Colleges states that Earmarked Capital funding covers two types of capital expenditure of grants:
 - 1) Capital expenditure to expand the infrastructure of existing campuses or to construct new campuses; and
 - 2) Capital expenditure required to address capital infrastructure backlogs inherited from spending in the past.
 - 5.2 Paragraph 62 of the NNSF-TVET Colleges states DHET must develop special conditions on the expenditure of grants; and
 - 5.3 Section 61 of the NNSF-TVET Colleges proposes that DHET must ensure transparent and fair procedures to allocate earmarked capital funding to colleges. However, it is not required that all colleges be funded equitably concerning this stream every financial year. Targeting colleges for years is thus permissible. However, in the medium to long term, the distribution of earmarked capital funding across colleges must be equitably pro-poor.
- 6. This policy intends to respond to the National Development Plan of 2030, which aims to reduce the technical skill shortages in South Africa by expanding the TVET colleges by providing adequate and well-maintained infrastructure, thereby increasing student enrolment. This advances the South African Government's goals to create employment opportunities; develop skills; grow the economy; reduce inequality, and increase access to education as a fundamental human right as enshrined in the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa (1996). The premise for the development of the infrastructure funding

norms for public TVET Colleges derives from both internal and external policy and legislative imperatives, namely:

- 6.1 The Constitution of the Republic of South Africa (Act 108 of 1996);
- 6.2 Continuing Education and Training Act No.16 of 2006 (CET Act 16 of 2006);
- 6.3 National Norms and Standards for Funding TVET Colleges (NNSF-TVET Colleges).
- 6.4 The Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Framework.
- 6.5 National Development Plan (NDP) 2030;
- 6.6 Public Finance Management Act (Act 1 of 1999); and
- 6.7 Government Immovable Asset Management (GIAMA) Act.
- 7. The position of the South African Government is on transforming its approach to the planning and implementation of capital projects and clearly articulates funding for TVET Colleges' infrastructure. This policy is an essential document as its development occurs when funding infrastructure in the education sector, mainly the TVET sector, is an ongoing debate and should ensure needs based allocation of infrastructure funds to TVET Colleges.
- 8. Infrastructure expansion and maintenance of the existing immovable assets should make TVET Colleges accessible to communities. Constructing new buildings and surveying all public spaces for learning which includes closed schools will increase the learning space in TVET colleges. The Department should prioritise improving less-resourced infrastructure in rural community areas.

Redress, equity, and quality

- 9. The Minister of Higher Education, Science and Innovation regards redress and equity in public TVET College infrastructure as critical to improving the quality of further education and training. The Preamble of the CET Act 16 of 2006 states that:
- "...redress past discrimination and ensure representivity and equal access. Ensure access to basic adult education, further education and training, and the workplace through continuing education and training by persons who have been marginalised in the past, such as women, the disabled, and the disadvantaged".

- 10. To systematically achieve the objectives outlined in the CET Act (Act No16 of 2006), DHET requires additional budgeting and funding for public TVET Colleges.
- 11. These infrastructure funding norms and standards require that public TVET Colleges honour the duties of the state to address the right to education through reasonable measures to South African citizens by the provision of resources progressively. Education-related needs are mostly greater than the available resources. Therefore, the spending on public TVET Colleges infrastructure must target the needs of the poor and previously disadvantaged to redress the past imbalances, improve equity and ensure quality education.

The rationale behind the development of this funding policy

- 12. The South African TVET Colleges are given a task through its National Development Plan to have 1.25 million students enrolled in TVET colleges by 2030, a significant increase from 540 000 students enrolled in 2022. This will become a significant driver in addressing inequality, unemployment, and poverty. To achieve the development goals and objectives of the South African government, the Department of Higher Education and Training should expand TVET infrastructure to increase access to TVET Colleges.
- 13. All public TVET Colleges require adequate provisions with the required quality standards applicable for infrastructure linked to the different programmes offered, avoiding infringing the individual right to education. In funding a public TVET College, Section 23 of the Continuing Education and Training (CET) Act, 2006 (Act 16 of 2006) propose that the Ministry of Higher Education, Science and Innovation should determine the minimum norms and standards for the funding of public colleges.

B. SCOPE AND APPLICATION

14. These Norms and Standards for Infrastructure Funding apply to all public TVET Colleges.

People's right to education

15. The Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, (No. 108 of 1996) establishes the right to education in these terms:

"Everyone has the right to:

- (a) Basic education, including adult basic education, and
- (b) Further education, which the state, through reasonable measures must progressively make available and accessible".
- 16. The TVET Collegs infrastructure funding norms and standards serves as a departmental vehicle supporting the Constitutional right to education. This policy focuses on college expansion; repairs and maintenance; as well as ICT improvement that will support online education. It is designed to deal with the challenges of unequal access to TVET Colleges and inequality concerning the quality of the education these colleges provide due to lack of required facilities.

Challenges experienced in the South African Technical Vocational Education and Training sector

- 17. DHET shall use this infrastructure funding policy to address the challenges faced by TVET Colleges as follows:
 - 17.1 The current inadequate and poor infrastructure, i.e., dilapidated buildings, inadequate ablution facilities, bulk services, and improved access for people with disabilities. There should be an optimal utilisation of Infrastructure facilities in TVET Colleges.
- 18. Problems associated with inadequate infrastructure funding in TVET Colleges pose a severe threat to the quality of education and training offered by colleges. If infrastructure funding is not addressed correctly, this may contribute to poor performance by TVET Colleges.

C. THE ROLE OF PUBLIC TVET COLLEGE

19. Public TVET Colleges focus on vocational and occupational education and training to prepare students to become productive workers in skilled trades and other intermediate occupations. Public TVET colleges are funded from State funds administered by DHET.

D. FRAMEWORK FOR THE PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING OF TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Positioning public infrastructure funding for technical and vocational education and Training at TVET Colleges

- 20. Government infrastructure budgets have been under strenuous pressure over the past several years due to lower economic growth, lower tax revenue, and a shift in spending priorities, such as a reduction in higher education funding. Revenue shortfalls and rising spending pressure threaten the government's ability to invest in new infrastructure.
- 21. The education delivery to students requires collaboration between the public and the private sector (i.e. public-private partnership-PPP) infrastructure provision. This is done as follows:
 - 21.1 The private sector performs the function provided by the public sector and utilises state property according to the partnership agreement. The project risks, such as technical, operational, and financial, are transferred to the private sector. The public sector pays for the complete services, including infrastructure repairs and maintenance and the construction of new buildings; and
 - 21.2 This policy encourages a public-private partnership to improve public infrastructure provision in priority areas with the potential to attract private-sector funding and contribute to economic development. This promotes widespread and appropriate technical and vocational education and training for the historically disadvantaged and vulnerable population who could not privately access this type of education.
- 22. Some unused public infrastructure resources, such as previous public teacher training colleges, should be considered for use and transfer ownership to the TVET Colleges. An audit must be conducted on the sustainability and cost-effectiveness of the TVET Colleges taking over these teacher training colleges. This will give the government a clear picture of the budget required to fund infrastructure in TVET colleges.

E. MECHANISM OF INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING ALLOCATION

- 23. To strive towards equitable infrastructure funding of public TVET colleges, each college must:
 - i. Provide credible infrastructure needs for appropriate planning and budgeting by the Department on the yearly basis.
 - ii. Implement necessary data-based systems to guide planning for infrastructure provisioning and budget funding allocations.
 - iii. Provide evidence to DHET on the progress update on infrastructure spending from the funds transferred to the TVET College
- 24. The measures contained in this policy apply to the maintenance and repairs activities of existing TVET college infrastructure and the construction of new buildings such as new classrooms, libraries, laboratories, workshops, and hubs as well as improvement in ICT infrastructure for more connectivity and digitisation of TVET College activities. Implementing the infrastructure funding norms and standards is subject to the availability of resources and the cooperation of other government agencies and entities responsible for infrastructure funding.
- 25. The TVET Colleges must annually provide the Department with three (3) year rolling infrastructure funding requirements and/or Maintenance Plans. The medium-term plans should be submitted to the Department by 30 September each year, and the reporting format may be determined by DHET.
- 26. The funding mechanism for TVET Colleges' infrastructure will be based on 60% of funding reserved for new infrastructure (such as new buildings with fencing, ICT); 30% of funding is reserved for repairs and maintenance for all TVET Colleges; and 10% of funding is reserved as discretionary funding by DHET which will be applied for emergency projects. The projects may either be identified by the Department or recommended by the TVET Colleges Councils and Regional Managers for endorsement by Director General.
- 27. It is required that TVET Colleges submit funding applications through three-year costed rolling maintenance plans for all infrastructure needs to the DHET. DHET will assess fully

costed funding applications in terms of priority and criticality. Application will be based on the requirements below to be allocated funding:

- 27.1 Criticality is considered as the following:
 - Extremely urgent where there is life-threatening to serious injury, or service delivery has failed, and the consequential damage negatively impacts the college cash flow.
 - ii. Moderately urgent may cause minor injuries and compromise service delivery, and the direct cost is high with less consequential costs.
- iii. Low critical is where there is no threat to human life. The direct costs are marginal and low consequential costs.

27.2 Priority is considered as the following:

- I. High priority where the condition of the component is unfit for use, and it is an immediate high risk to health and safety or property.
- II. Medium priority in which the component's availability is limited, and unavailability affects service delivery and performance of other components.
- III. Low priority where the component has minor defects and a minor inconvenience to operations. The probability of risk to health and safety or property is low, and its unavailability is not influencing service levels
- 28. DHET will consider from time to time to appoint Infrastructures auditors to provide audit reports on the state and infrastructure conditions as well as required needs by the TVET Colleges
- 29. Other aspects that should be considered for funding applications are as follows:
 - 29.1 Property evaluation conducted by the Independent Evaluator. The DHET may consider appointing Independent Evaluator for all TVET Colleges, subject to availability of funds;
 - 29.2 Student enrolment plans for the following year by TVET Colleges to determine the budget allocation of the financial year under review; and
 - 29.3 The property's occupancy rate or any other method that may be deemed appropriate for DHET to allocate funds to TVET Colleges. DHET must be satisfied with the optimal utilisation of the buildings. This requires the college to provide detailed utilisation of the building to the DHET The occupancy rate will indicate where there is a need or no need for additional buildings.

- 30. The funding for new infrastructure includes furniture, fittings, and equipment required to render the infrastructure functional. TVET Colleges must submit formal application letters to the Department for new infrastructure stating amongst others:
 - 30.1 The type of infrastructure required;
 - 30.2 The estimated cost; and
 - 30.3 Motivation which should indicate how urgent is request.
- 31. The spending of the funds is subject to the conditions that DHET will develop and communicate to the TVET Colleges through various forms that include Circulars and DHET Communique.

F. AREAS OF FUNDING AT PUBLIC TVET COLLEGES

32. New building:

The new building should include furniture and equipment to be ready for openationalisation.

33. The infrastructure facilities

- Teaching, learning, and training center: A campus should operate as a learning centre with the primary objective of teaching, learning, and training. A learning centre houses the following facilities: faculty rooms, offices, staff entertainment, reconciliation area, administration, administration offices, equipment for training delivery, classrooms, lecture theatres, workshops, simulation areas, media, and ICT connectivity to deliver the necessary teaching and learning content.
- 33.2 The living center: the construction of such a college considers that students and faculty spend most of their day.
- 33.3 Fitness centres as part of a sports complex.
- Entertainment centre: Aspects such as surfing the net, attending a concert or sports event, and joining a club or fraternity.

Components of TVET College infrastructure

- 34. Components of TVET College infrastructure are as follows:
 - 34.1 College central offices (separate or part of a lecturing and learning site).
 - 34.2 The sites where teaching and learning are taking place.

- 34.3 The sites for student support services for teaching and learning.
- 34.4 Student accommodation.
- 34.5 Sporting and recreational facilities.
- 34.6 Any site that the college has ownership or right of access and on which it intends to operate in any manner (this is for greenfield sites that colleges want to start developing), and brownfield that can be improved for reuse.

Source of funding

- 35. The funding sources diversification includes the following:
 - 35.1 Voted funds (Earmarked Capital Funding). The funding comes with conditions set by DHET to prevent mismanagement of the funds.
 - 35.2 External sources like private donors.
 - 35.3 Public-Private Partnership.
 - 35.4 Budget Facility Infrastructure (BFI).
 - 35.5 National Skills Fund (NSF).

Basic services

36. Water supply

It is essential for TVET Colleges to have access to suitable and sufficient water supply and storage facilities. These include one or more of the following:

- 36.1 A municipal water reticulation network;
- 36.2 Own borehole(s) with storage tank(s) and reticulation system;
- 36.3 Own reservoir or storage tank(s) to store municipal water for use during water supply disruptions. The reservoir or storage tanks need to water distribution to the campus ensuring that stored water flows during water disruptions. Stored water must not become stagnant.
- 36.4 Rainwater harvesting for flushing of toilets and irrigation;
- 36.5 Greywater water harvesting system (only for irrigation purposes); and
- 36.6 This policy covers every college site, including all college outbuildings, with appropriate fencing to a minimum height of at least 1.8 meters and a CAT 3 Security classification.

37. Sanitation

All TVET Colleges must have sufficient ablution facilities that are easily accessible to all students. This includes students and staff with disabilities, providing privacy and security,

promoting health and hygiene standards, and complying with all relevant laws while keeping them in good order. Sanitation facilities could include one or more of the following:

- 37.1 Waterborne sanitation;
- 37.2 Small-bore sewer reticulation;
- 37.3 Septic or conservancy tank systems;
- 37.4 Greywater recycling systems;
- 37.5 Urine-diverting toilets (known as dry toilets);
- 37.6 Composting toilet (NO Pit Latrines are permitted)

38. Stormwater

The TVET College campus requires an appropriate stormwater system to ensure the entire campus's drainage. This could include one or more of the following:

- 38.1 Municipal drainage system; and
- 38.2 On-site attenuation includes swales, filter strips, infiltration trenches, attenuation ponds, green roofs, rainwater harvesting, and permeable pavements.

39. Gutters and downpipes

The buildings must have suitable galvanised gutters and downpipes around buildings, to drain and remove stormwater that complies with relevant standards or building regulations and holding aprons.

40. College safety and security

This policy covers every college site, including all college outbuildings and other security matters as outlined in the 2021/22 minimum physical security standards for DHET, including TVET Colleges.

41. Bulk service

Facilities such as electrical reticulation, backup generators, Uninterrupted Power Supply (UPS) systems, solar systems, water supply, and others in Hydrogen Economy.

G. TYPES OF INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDED IN TVET COLLEGES

- 42. The TVET Colleges' infrastructure funding norms and standards consider the following:
 - 42.1 New building construction: The TVET infrastructure funding caters to teaching qualifications with simulation classrooms and non-teaching buildings such as Student Support Services and a cafeteria. DHET will apply the approved geographic classification and make provisions to consider the difference between rural and urban buildings. This funding will constitute 60% of the allocated funds by National Treasury.
 - 42.2 Repairs and maintenance: Repairs and maintenance are done on an ongoing basis, as and when, and the needs analysis should inform a college maintenance requirement for maintenance. This funding will constitute 20% of the allocated funds by National Treasury.
 - 42.3 There will further be budget allocation to Discretional funding for unplanned emerging urgent projects which will constitute 20% of the Budget Allocation by NT.
- 43. The infrastructure funding norms and standards provide for TVET Colleges' universal access, which complies with the requirements related to the nature of the specialised support programmes offered at the college and the support level required.
 - The National Plan for Higher Education in South Africa (2001) states that:
 "The Ministry recognises that it may not be possible for every institution to provide the full array of infrastructure needed to service the specific educational needs of disabled students. This provides an ideal opportunity for the Department to develop a strategy to ensure that disabled students are catered to. However, at a minimum, all institutions should have the basic infrastructure to allow unrestricted access to the campus for disabled students and community members".
- 44. Other infrastructure works: DHET will utilise the funding made available from various sources that include NT to upgrade and refurbish the existing infrastructure. Infrastructure works include but are not limited to land and buildings acquired or donated by other departments that are the custodians of immovable assets. Such infrastructure may consist of roads and fencing, which come as a standard provision for new campuses, and the ablution facilities that meet the regulations set out by the National Building Regulations.

45. The policy makes provision for both rural and urban environments. The funding framework should respond to the needs of the historically disadvantaged TVET Colleges and rural colleges with small campuses far from the central office Twenty percent of the allocated budget will be earmarked for these institutions.

H. RESEARCH, PLANNING, MONITORING, AND EVALUATION

- 46. DHET is responsible for monitoring and evaluating the implementation of the funding norms annually or at other specified intervals, as stated in Section 41G of the Continuing Education and Training (CET) Act, 2006 (Act No.16 of 2006). The Minister emphasises the importance of DHET in monitoring and evaluating to ensure compliance with the Constitution of South Africa.
- 47. DHET must verify compliance to allocated funds with the national norms or implement acceptable alternatives. DHET may assist a TVET College if it finds it challenging to comply with the given norms and standards due to a lack of expertise and other reasons. In that case, DHET must be informed without undue delay to remedy the problem
- 48. The monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Framework for DHET states that "the impetus of Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) is driven mainly by the demand for greater accountability of publicly funded organisations and institutions. Governments are increasingly called upon to be more transparent and accountable to the public, to demonstrate results emanating from their policies and actions, and demonstrate value for money".
- 49. Section 26(3) of the CET Act 16 of 2006 emphasises that the Minister may withhold the funds if the management staff or college council fails to comply with the provision or conditions timeously.
- 50. The focus of monitoring funds is on two aspects:
 - 50.1 Result-oriented monitoring based on TVET College's progress in implementing the project following the grant conditions.
 - 50.2 Financial utilisation following agreed utilisation standards.

- 50.3 Financial monitoring that assesses financial compliance by TVET Colleges and
- 51. DHET requires reporting of the project implementation to the Department through a reporting template that will be provided to TVET Colleges with timelines. The reporting will be made at the following intervals:
 - 51.1 During *the planning phase*, the projects in the approved Maintenance Plans must apply potential corrective measures and determine if there is a risk involved that will be during project implementation.
 - 51.2 The implementation phase ensures that the projects in the approved Maintenance Plans are implemented as planned.
 - 51.3 During the close-out phase, DHET's responsibility is to ensure that the project's completion is according to the work scope and the value allocated for money.
- 52. It is essential to allocate funds for research, monitoring, and systems development to ensure the infrastructure funding system's success. The TVET Colleges must convince the Department that all measures are being taken into account during the application for new infrastructure funding. This will include the following:
 - 52.1 TVET colleges must develop monitoring systems to improve data relevance and reliability for the TVET sector.
 - 52.2 The development of information systems that include financial accounting
- 53. The implementation date will be determined by the Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Innovation.

I. CONCLUSION

54. The infrastructure funding norms are to provide a framework to allow uniformity in spending and accountability, and reporting by TVET Colleges. TVET Colleges' responsibility is to ensure the implementation progresses and make any corrective measures contributing to improving efficiency.

Amendment of Rule 1 of the Rules

1. The following rule is hereby substituted for Rule 1:

"Definitions

1. In these [r]Rules, any word or expression to which a meaning has been assigned in the Act has the meaning so assigned and, unless the context indicates otherwise—

"aggrieved employee" means an employee—

- (a) on whose behalf a grievance is referred to the Commission; or
- (b) who has lodged a grievance with the Commission;
- "Cluster Commissioner" means a commissioner appointed in terms of section 196(7)(a) of the Constitution, and who has been assigned responsibility by the Commission to be the overseer of a particular department in order to assist the Commission in executing its mandate in terms of the Constitution;
- "[Condonation Application Form] <u>Application for Late Referral Form</u>" means the form prescribed in Annexure B to these [r]Rules;
- "day" refers to any day other than a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday and it is calculated to exclude the first day but includes the last day;
- "department" has the meaning ascribed to it by the Public Service Act;
- "date of becoming aware" means the date on which the act or omission resulting in the awareness of the prejudice to the aggrieved's rights, occurred and this date initiates the beginning of the 90-day timeframe within which the aggrieved employee has to lodge the grievance;

[&]quot;employee" has the meaning ascribed to it by the Public Service Act;

[&]quot;executive authority" has the meaning ascribed to it in the Public Service Act;

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"grievance" means a dissatisfaction or complaint formally lodged in writing by an aggrieved employee over an official act or omission contemplated in section 196(4)(f)(ii) of the Constitution, but excludes a grievance over an unfair dismissal;

"Grievance Referral Form" means the form prescribed in Annexure A to these [r]Rules;

"head of department" has the meaning ascribed to it by the Public Service Act;

"investigator" means a person authorised or delegated by the Commission in terms of section 13 of the Public Service Commission Act, 1997 (Act No. 46 of 1997), to investigate grievances as provided for in section 196(4)(f)(ii) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 [(Act No. 106 of 1996)];

"Public Service Act" means the Public Service Act, 1994 (Proclamation No. 103 of 1994);

"representative" means a fellow employee, <u>an</u> official of a recognised trade union or <u>a</u> family member, <u>and does not include legal representation</u>;

"Provincially-based Commissioner" means a commissioner appointed in terms of section 196(7)(b) of the Constitution;

"the Act" means the Public Service Commission Act, 1997 (Act No. 46 of 1997).

Amendment of Rule 3 of the Rules

- 2. Rule 3 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the insertion after subrule (4)(b) of the following subrule:
 - "(4A) The employee referring the grievance in terms of subrules (4) must do so within 30 days of becoming aware of the executive authority's failure as indicated in the above-mentioned subrules.";
- (b) by the substitution for sub-rule (5) of the following subrule:
 - "(5) If an official of a recognised trade union as <u>the</u> representative of an employee acts on behalf of the employee in terms of subrule (4), the relevant part in the <u>Commission</u> Grievance Referral Form must be completed by both the employee and representative.";
- (c) by the substitution for subrule (6) of the following subrule:
 - "(6) In case of the lodging of a collective grievance, all employees concerned must sign the Commission Grievance Referral Form.";
- (d) by the substitution for subrule (7) of the following subrule:
 - "(7) [(a)] If the employee who lodged a grievance with the executive authority became seriously ill to the extent that he or she could not personally pursue the grievance, or passes away, his or her representative may refer the grievance to the Commission.
 - [(b) Paragraph (a) applies with the changes required by the context in a case where the employee passed on before the matter could be resolved.]"; and
- (e) by the insertion after subrule (8) of the Rules of the following subrule:
 - "(9) The Commission may, in exceptional circumstances, and in accordance with the provisions of rule 9, consider grievances that are referred to it outside the timeframe provided for in these Rules."

Amendment of Rule 4 of the Rules

- 3. Rule 4 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the substitution for subrule (1) of the following subrule:
 - "4. (1) A grievance submitted to the Commission in terms of rule 3 must be addressed to ["The Chairperson of] the Public Service Commission[" or Commissioner based in that particular Province, using either the postal or physical address of the Commission as listed in Annexure D].";
- (b) by the substitution for subrule (3) of the following subrule:
 - "(3)(a) Subject to rule 5, referrals must be signed and dated by the employee and must be accompanied by a copy of the duly completed Grievance Form, signed and dated by the aggrieved employee, the designated employee appointed by the relevant department to facilitate the resolution of grievances, and where applicable, also signed and dated by the relevant executive authority.
 - (b) In the absence of the signature of the designated employee, proof of submission to the designated employee must be provided."; and
- (c) by the substitution for subrule (4) of the following subrule:
 - "(4) (a) An aggrieved employee who cannot write may visit any office of the Commission and may request to be assisted with the completion the Commission Grievance Referral Form.
 - (b) The Commission must request that the employee to affix his or her left or right thumb print to the Commission Grievance Referral Form.

Amendment of Rule 5 of the Rules

- **4.** Rule 5 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the substitution for rule 5(1)(a) of the following rule:
 - "5. (1) (a) Referral by an executive authority in terms of rule 3(1) must be done in writing by the executive authority, or an employee so delegated by the executive

authority, within the timeframe prescribed in rule 3(3), using the Commission_Grievance Referral Form.

- (b) by the substitution for rule 5(3) of the following rule:
 - "(3) Referral by the aggrieved employee or his or her representative in terms of rule 3(4), (5) or (6) must be done—
 - (a) within the timeframe prescribed in the department's grievance procedure for such referral after the lapse of the prescribed timeframe for the executive authority to deal with the grievance, or on the lapse of the agreed date of extension between the employee and the department or executive authority; [and]
 - (b) after following the necessary steps provided for in the department's grievance procedure; and
 - (c) in line with the provisions of rule 3(4A) of these Rules."; and
- (c) by the substitution for rule 5(4) of the following rule:
 - "(4) In referring the grievance in terms of rule 3(4), (5), or (6) the aggrieved employee must—
 - (a) complete and sign the Grievance Referral Form in full in order to provide the Commission with the information required in the Grievance Referral Form;
 - (b) provide the Commission with a copy of the Grievance Form used to lodge the grievance with the executive authority, which Grievance Form must have been signed by both the aggrieved employee and the representative of the executive authority as proof that the grievance procedure of the department was followed;
 - (c) in the case of a member of the Senior Management Service and heads of departments, provide the Commission with proof that the aggrieved employee had directed an inquiry in writing to the department or executive authority regarding the status of his or her grievance and that he or she was not provided with a response within five days; and
 - (d) provide the Commission with copies of all correspondence between the aggrieved employee and the department or executive authority on the grievance in question.".

Substitution of Rule 6 of the Rules

5. The following rule is hereby substituted for rule 6 of the Rules:

"Office hours

6. [Grievances] Whereas grievances may be referred to or lodged with the Commission any day, [from Monday to Friday, excluding public holidays, between] they will be processed during the official operating hours of the Commission, which is from 08h00 (8am) to 16h30 (4.30 pm)."

Amendment of Rule 7 of the Rules

- **6.** Rule 7 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the substitution for rule 7(1) of the following rule:
 - "(1)(a) A head of department may refer a grievance which he or she has lodged with the executive authority in terms of section 35(3)(a) of the Public Service Act to the Commission if the grievance is not resolved within 45 days of receipt thereof by the executive authority or within the timeframes agreed between them in writing.
 - (b) A head of department referring his or her grievance in terms of paragraph

 (a) must do so within 30 days of becoming aware of the executive

 authority's failure to deal with the grievance."; and
- (b) by the substitution for subrule (5) of the following subrule:
 - "(5) (a) A head of department may lodge his or her grievance directly with the Commission if—
 - (i) the executive authority has refused to receive his or her Grievance Form;
 - (ii) when trying to resolve the grievance informally with the executive authority before completing a Grievance Form, the executive authority—
 - (aa) fails to respond to his or her correspondence; or
 - (bb) refuses to advise him or her by when the grievance would be resolved.

- (b) A head of department may lodge a grievance with the Commission directly within 90 days of becoming aware of the official act or omission by—
 - [(a)](i) completing the Commission_Grievance Referral Form;
 - [(b)](ii) attaching copies of all documents relevant to the grievance;
 - [(c)](iii) indicating the steps taken to resolve the grievance before referring it to the Commission;
 - [(d)](iv) providing written reasons for direct referral;
 - [(e)](v) informing the executive authority of the direct lodging of the grievance with the Commission by—
 - [(i)] (aa) serving the executive authority with a copy of the Commission Grievance Referral Form and documents submitted to the Commission; and
 - [(ii)] (bb) requesting acknowledgement of proof of receipt; and [(f)](vi) providing the Commission with proof that the executive authority was properly informed.".

Substitution of Rule 8 of the Rules

- **7.** The following rule is hereby substituted for rule 8 of the Rules:
 - **"8.** (1) Strict compliance with the timeframes prescribed in the department's grievance procedure and these **[r]**Rules is mandatory in order to ensure a speedy resolution of grievances and promote sound labour relations.
 - (2) [Subject to subrule (3), the] The Commission may deal with the grievance only if the grievance was lodged with the executive authority by the aggrieved employee within 90 days of the aggrieved employee becoming aware of the official act or omission, or in line with the timeframe as prescribed in the departmental grievance policy.
 - [(3) The Commission may deal with grievances that were lodged with the executive authority by the aggrieved employee after the expiry of the 90 days period referred to in subrule (2), if—
 - (a) the department's grievance procedure permits for the lodging of grievances outside that period; and
 - (b) the department's prescribed timeframe was complied with.]
 - (4) An executive authority referring a grievance that was lodged after the 90 days period or outside the department's prescribed timeframe for the lodging of a grievance, must provide the Commission with—

- (a) written reasons why the grievance was considered despite the noncompliance with the prescribed timeframes; or
- (b) proof that condonation was applied for by the aggrieved employee and granted by the executive authority.
- (5) An aggrieved employee referring a grievance that was lodged outside the prescribed timeframe must provide proof that condonation was granted by the executive authority, [which] who then afterwards failed to finalise the grievance within the prescribed timeframe.
- (6) The Commission must finalise the investigation of a properly referred grievance and provide the aggrieved employee concerned and relevant executive authority with the outcome within 30 days of receipt of all information.
- (7) The Commission must, in cases where it foresees that it will not be able to meet the timeframe prescribed in subrule (6) advise the aggrieved employee concerned and relevant executive authority of its inability to finalise the grievance within the timeframe, and must provide them with reasons for the delay."

Substitution of Rule 9 of the Rules

8. The following Rule is hereby substituted for rule 9 of the Rules:

"[Application for condonation] <u>Consideration of grievances referred outside the</u> Commission timeframes for referral

- **9.** (1) The aggrieved employee **[or executive authority]** must, if **[one of them]** he or she wishes to refer a grievance which is outside the timeframe prescribed for referral to the Commission, first **[apply for condonation]** request approval for late referral to the Commission, by completing the Application for Late Referral Form.
- [(2) (a) The party applying for condonation must complete the Condonation Application Form.
 - (b) In the case of an executive authority, the Condonation Application Form may be completed by an employee so delegated by the executive authority.]
 - (3) (a) The Commission must within five days of receipt of the [Condonation] Application for Late Referral Form, request the executive authority [or the aggrieved employee, as the case may be,] to comment on the request for [condonation] late referral.

- (b) The [party] executive authority responding to the request must use the [Condonation] Application for Late Referral Form and must furnish the Commission with his or her comments within five days of receipt of the Commission's request for comments.
- (4) The Commission may finalise the application for [condonation] <u>late referral</u> without the [responding party's] <u>executive authority's</u> comments if the latter fails to respond within the stipulated timeframe.
- (5) The Commission must consider the application for [condonation] <u>late referral</u> and provide the [party] <u>aggrieved employee</u> applying for [condonation] <u>late referral</u> with its decision within 10 days of receipt of the application.
- (6) The **[party]** <u>aggrieved employee</u> applying for **[condonation]** <u>late referral</u> must address the following issues in its application for **[condonation]** <u>late referral</u>[-]:
 - (a) The degree of lateness;
 - (b) The reasons for lateness;
 - (c) The extent of prejudice likely to be suffered if the Commission does not investigate the grievance sought to be referred;
 - (d) Any prejudice to the other party;
 - (e) Any practical remedy for, or possible solution, to the grievance;
 - (f) Any prospects that the outcome of the Commiss'on's investigation will resolve the grievance;
 - (g) Any special circumstances why the grievance should be considered; and
 - (h) Any other relevant factors.
- (7) The Commission must consider the application for **[condonation]** <u>late referral</u> based on the issues referred to in subrule (6)] and must provide reasons for its decision.
- (8) Applications for [condonation] <u>late referral</u> must be considered by the Cluster Commissioner responsible for the department involved and in the Commission's provincial offices, the Provincially-based Commissioner must consider the application for [condonation] <u>late referral</u>.
- (9) The Cluster Commissioner or Provincially-based Commissioner contemplated in subrule [(8)] (7) must within the timeframe prescribed in subrule [(5)] (4) issue the aggrieved employee [concerned or relevant executive authority] with his or her decision by completing the relevant section in the [Condonation] Application for Late Referral Form.
- (10) In cases where [condonation]a request for late referral is granted, the [party] aggrieved employee applying for [condonation] late referral must refer his or

- her grievance documents to the Commission within five days of receipt of the decision referred to in subrule (9).
- [(11) This rule applies to any of the timeframes prescribed in these Rules, except for the timeframe to comment on the draft report provided for in rule 17(9).]

Amendment of Rule 10 of the Rules

- 9. Rule 10 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the substitution for subrule (1) of the following subrule:
 - "(1) The Commission must upon receipt of a grievance[—
 - (a) open a file for the grievance and register it in either of the following database:
 - (i) Database for properly referred grievances; or
 - (ii) Database for no jurisdiction / not properly referred cases;
 - (b) number the grievance with a consecutive number for the year during which it was received and in the category under which it falls; and
 - (c)] acknowledge receipt [of the grievance] within [48 hours of receipt] five days thereof."; and
- (b) by the substitution for subrule (2) of the following subrule:
 - "(2) The Commission must within [three] seven days of receipt of a grievance—
 - (a) conduct a pre-assessment of the grievance to determine whether or not the Commission has jurisdiction to investigate the grievance and must advise the referring party accordingly; and
 - (b) where the Commission has jurisdiction, assign the grievance to one or more Commissioners, or to an investigator for investigation.".

Substitution of Rule 11 of the Rules

- 10. The following rule is hereby substituted for rule 11 of the Rules
 - "11. (1)(a) The investigator to whom a grievance has been assigned may, upon receipt of a grievance, request the aggrieved employee or executive authority to

provide additional information in order to enable the Commission to make a proper analysis and an informed decision on the finding of the grievance.

- (b) Where there is failure to provide the information as requested, the Commission may use its discretion to, in the case of
 - (i) the aggrieved employee—
 - (aai close the grievance without further investigation and a finding; or (bb) conclude the grievance by making findings based on the available information; and
 - (ii) the executive authority or department—
 - (aa) subpoena the executive authority, the head of the department or the relevant officials from which the information was requested, to give evidence and provide information, and also to explain why he or she failed to provide the information as was initially requested by the Commission; or (bb) conclude the grievance by making findings based on the available information.
- (2) Additional information from the department or executive authority may be requested—
 - (a) telephonically, followed by a written request, whether by e-mail or a [faxed] letter to the relevant employee of the department or to the executive authority;
 - (b) through a letter directed to the head of the relevant department;
 - (c) through consultation or interviews with the relevant employees from the relevant department or with the executive authority, provided that the request for a consultation or an interview is confirmed in writing, whether through e-mail or letter to the employees involved; or
 - (d) by visiting the relevant department or executive authority to obtain information or interview relevant employees.
- (3) (a) In a case where employees from the department are not cooperating in providing the requested information, [the Director-General of the Office of] the Commission [must] may request the information in an official letter addressed to the head of department concerned, and a copy sent to the relevant executive authority.
 - (b) The letter must contain a warning clause that failure by the head of department to provide the Commission with the required information within a period of [10] <u>five_days</u>, [will] <u>may_result_in_subpoena_being_issued_against_him_or_her_and_any_of_the_employees_from_whom_the_information</u>

was originally requested, and or conclude the grievance based on the information at its disposal.

- (4) In line with subrule (1), [If] if after receipt of the letter referred in subrule (3) the head of department fails to provide the information requested, the Commission may issue a subpoena, calling on the head of department and or the employees from whom the information was originally requested to appear before the Commission to be questioned at a time and place specified in the subpoena, or conclude the grievance based on the information at its disposal.
- (5) Should the Commission decide on issuing a subpoena, [The] the Cluster Commissioner or the Provincially-based Commissioner, as the case may be, or any Commissioner so delegated by the Commission must conduct or lead the enquiry emanating from the issue of the subpoena.
- (6) The Commission may report any executive authority that fails to provide the Commission with information required in its investigations to the National Assembly or relevant Provincial Legislature, as the case may be.

Amendment of Rule 12 of the Rules

- 11. Rule 12 of the Rules is hereby amended—
- (a) by the substitution for subrule (1) of the following rule:
 - "12. (1) The Commission may after pre-assessment decide to—
 - (a) close the grievance without any further investigation;
 - (b) resolve the grievance through mediation;
 - (c) investigate the grievance and subject it to deliberations before a Panel of Commissioners, who must make a finding—
 - (i) that the allegation is true, supported by evidence and therefore substantiated;
 - (ii) that the allegation is not true, not supported by evidence and therefore unsubstantiated:
 - (iii) of no jurisdiction; or
 - (iv) that the grievance must be deferred for further investigation;
 - (d) conduct a formal inquiry into the <u>grievance</u> in terms of section 10 of the Act read with rule 17; or

- (e) refer the grievance to an appropriate public body or authority, including the Public Protector appointed as such in terms of section 1A of the Public Protector Act, 1994 (Act No. 23 of 1994)."; and
- (b) by the substitution for subrule (3) of the following rule:
 - "(3) (a) The Commission must communicate the outcome of its investigation in writing to the executive authority and where the grievance was referred by an aggrieved employee, also to the aggrieved employee.
 - (b) Where the grievance was referred by the executive authority, the Commission shall provide the aggrieved employee with a copy of the outcome submitted to the executive authority.".

Substitution of Rule 13 of the Rules

12. The following rule is hereby substituted for rule 13 of the Rules

"Grievances closed without further investigation

- The Commission must close grievances without further investigation if—
 - (a) there is prima facie no compliance with the grievance procedure of the relevant department and the aggrieved employee has, after having been afforded an opportunity to provide proof of compliance, failed to do so within the period prescribed by the Commission;
 - (b) the aggrieved employee has failed to complete the <u>Commission</u> Grievance Referral Form;
 - (c) after referral, the aggrieved [person] employee informs the Commission in writing that he or she is withdrawing the grievance;
 - (d) after referral, the executive authority [or the aggrieved employee] informs the Commission in writing that the grievance was subsequently resolved internally and provides the Commission with proof of such resolution;
 - (dA) after referral, the aggrieved employee informs the Commission, in writing, that the grievance was subsequently resolved internally;
 - (dB) after consideration by the Commission, and without any of the parties so advising the Commission, it is clear from the information before the Commission that the grievance is resolved, or is before pending before a

- bargaining council, court, other alternative dispute resolution forum or any other institution that has jurisdiction to entertain the matter;
- (e) the Commission is informed by the aggrieved employee [or the executive authority] that the same [matter] grievance is pending before a bargaining council, court, other alternative dispute resolution forum or any other institution that has jurisdiction to entertain the matter.
- (eA) the Commission is informed by the executive authority that the same matter is pending before a bargaining council, court, other alternative dispute resolution forum or any other institution that has jurisdiction to entertain the matter, and provide the Commission with proof of same;
- _(f) the grievance was referred by a former employee on a matter which he or she raised with the executive authority after his or her termination of service, in which case the grievances must be referred to the executive authority for further handling in terms of section 3(8) of the Public Service Act;
- (g) the grievance relates to allegations of unfair dismissal; [or]
- (h) the grievance relates to a matter which is the subject of a disciplinary action being taken against the aggrieved employee[.];
- (i) matter referred does not fall within a definition of a grievance;
- the alleged act or omission does not adversely affect the aggrieved employee in his or her employment relationship;
- (k) it is established that the referred grievance is a duplicate of another grievance already referred to the PSC by or on behalf of the aggrieved employee; or
- (1) it is frivolous, vexatious or malicious in nature.
- (1A) In deciding whether or not the grievance is frivolous, vexatious or malicious the Commission shall consider, among others, the following:
 - (a) The effect on the employment relationship between the aggrieved and the person against whom the grievance is lodged;
 - (b) the value-add in the promotion or maintenance of sound labour relations between the aggrieved employee and the employer and labour peace and harmony in the workplace;
 - (c) the genuiness or legitimacy of the grievance;
 - (d) the supporting evidence (is the grievance supported by facts or is it speculative or hypothetical); and
 - (e) any other relevant factors.

The Commission must close a grievance if, after receipt thereof, the aggrieved employee or the employee against whom the grievance is lodged passes on, retires or resigns, and continuation of the investigation would not have an outcome which has any bearing on the aggrieved employee's financial benefits [and] or integrity.".

Amendment of Rule 17

- 13. Rule 17 of the Rules is hereby amended—
 - (a) by the substitution for subrule (6)(d) of the following rule:
 - "(d) Provincially-based Commissioner, who must before the commencement of the hearing—
 - [(a)](i) welcome the parties and explain the purpose of the hearing;
 - [(b)](ii) formally record the details of the participants and their designations;
 - [(c)](iii) explain the inquisitorial nature of the hearing and the procedure to be followed;
 - [(d)](iv) summarise the grievance and state the issue to be determined;
 - [(e)](v) indicate the order in which evidence will be taken from the witnesses and the role of other participants during the process;
 - [(f)](iv) make a determination on how documentary evidence will be taken; and
 - [(g)](vii) make any other determination necessary on any other aspect of the hearing."
 - (b) <u>by</u> the insertion in subrule (9) of the following rule:
 - "(9)(a) At the conclusion of the inquiry the Panel of Commissioners must evaluate the evidence and produce a provisional report with findings and recommendations, which, where necessary, must be made available to the parties to comment or respond thereon within the timeframe provided by the Commission.
 - (b) The Commission may, in exceptional circumstances, and in accordance with the provisions of rule 9 consider comments submitted to it outside the timeframe it

has set for the parties to submit their comments in terms of rule 17(9) of these Rules.".

Substitution of Rule 20 of the Rules

14. The following rule is hereby substituted for rule 20 of the Rules:

"Customer service

- **20. [(1)]** Enquiries about services rendered in respect of any grievance lodged or referred to the Commission may be made with the investigator concerned.
- [(2) Any person may raise his or her dissatisfaction with the handling of the grievance by the Commission by completing the Grievance Service Complaint Form prescribed in Annexure C to these rules and by submitting the form to the Commission.]".

Amendment of Annexures to the Rules

- **15.** The Annexures to the Rules are amended by the substitution of the following:
 - "A. Grievance Referral Form
 - B. [Condonation Application Form] Application for Late Referral Form
 - [C. Grievance Service Complaint Form]
 - [D. Physical and postal addresses of Commission]"

Short title and Commencement

These Rules shall be called the Public Service Commission Rules on the Referral and Investigation of Grievances of Employees in the Public Service Amendment of 2023, and shall come into operation on the date of publication in the *Gazette*.

DRAFT AMENDMENTS TO REGULATIONS MADE IN TERMS OF THE PRIVATE SECURITY INDUSTRY REGULATION ACT, 2001 (ACT NO 56. OF 2001)

 In this Schedule, "the Regulations" means the Private Security Industry Regulations published under Government Notice No. R.190 of 14 February 2002.

Amendment of regulation 1 of the Regulations

- Regulation 1 of the Regulations is hereby amended
 - a. by the insertion before the definition of "Board" of the following definition:

"application for renewal" means an application for renewal of registration certificate as a security service provider in terms of these regulations;

b. by the insertion after the definition of "Board" of the following definition:

"Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act" means the Compensation for Occupational and Diseases Act, 1993 (Act No. 130 of 1993), and any amendments made;

c. by the insertion after the definition of "director" of the following definitions:

"expiry date" means -

- in the case of a security officer, the last day of the month in every corresponding 24 months when a security officer was originally registered as a security officer in terms of the repealed legislation if such registration is covered by regulation 14(2) of these regulations or as a security service provider by the Authority in terms of the Act; and
- (b) in the case of a security business, the last day of the month in every corresponding 12 months when a security business was originally registered as a security officer in terms of the

repealed legislation if such registration is covered by regulation 14(2) of the Private Security Industry Regulations or as a security service provider by the Authority in terms of the Act;

"Firearms Control Act" means the Firearms Control Act, 2000 (Act No. 60 of 2000);

<u>"improper conduct"</u> means improper conduct as defined in the Code of Conduct for Security Service Providers, 2003;

<u>"independent security service provider"</u> means any natural person –

- (a) who assists in carrying or conducting the affairs of another security service provider, and who receives or is entitled toreceive from such other security service provider, any remuneration, reward, fee or benefit, as regards one or more security services;
- (b) who or whose services are directly or indirectly made available by another security service provider to any other person, and who receives or is entitled to receive from any other person any remuneration, reward, fee or benefit for rendering one or more security services

"in-house security" means every person who uses his or her own employees to protect or safeguard merely his or her own property or other interests, or persons or property on his or her premises or under his or her control;

"Performing Animals Protection Act" means the Performing Animals Protection Act, 1935 (Act No. 24 of 1935), as amended;

<u>"registered"</u> with reference to a security officer or a security service provider contemplated in the definition of "expiry date" in

this regulation of which the legal nature or status has changed since the original registration, means the granting of approval by the Authority in terms of the Act in respect of such change;

"renewal of registration certificate" means the granting by the Authority of an applicant's application for renewal of certificate in respect of the same person subject to the person meeting the requirements as contemplated in these regulations;

"Unemployment Insurance Act" means the Unemployment Insurance Act, 2001 (Act No. 63 of 2001), and any amendments made;

"working animal" means a security dog or a horse used to render a security service as contemplated in the Act.

Amendment of regulation 2 of the Regulations

2. Regulation 2 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Application for registration as security service provider

- a. by the insertion immediately after sub-regulation (1) of the following sub-regulation:
 - 1A. The application in sub-regulation (1) may include one or more of the following categories or classes of security services-
 - (a) quarding;
 - (b) close protection;
 - (c) response security;
 - (d) assets in transit;
 - (e) event security;

- (f) manufacturers, importers and distributors of listed equipment defined in the Interception of Communications and Provision of Communication-related Information Act, 2002 (Act No. 70 of 2002);
- (g) private investigators;
- (h) security training;
- (i) electronic security;
- (j) locksmith; or
- (k) security advisers.
- b. by the substitution for paragraphs (d) and (e) of sub-regulation (2) of the following paragraphs:
 - (d) an authenticated, recent, clear passport size photograph of the applicant <u>or digital photo in the format approved by the</u> <u>Authority</u>;
 - (e) a clear and complete set of fingerprints of the applicant, taken on the form used by the Service for this purpose, by or in the presence of a member of the Service or by or in the presence of an employee of the Authority designated in writing by the director to perform this function, or in any other electronic format or from any other source as approved by the Authority;
- c. by the substitution for subparagraph (i) of paragraph (a) of subregulation (3) of the following subparagraph:
 - (i) the relevant application fee <u>for each category or class of</u> <u>security service as contemplated in sub-regulation 1A</u>; and
- d. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (e) of sub-regulation(3) of the following paragraph:

- (eA) Notwithstanding the requirements of subregulation (3)(e), a declaration and details as determined by the director in respect of the ownership and or control of the applicant security business of persons who are not South African citizens;
- e. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (I) of sub-regulation(3) of the following paragraphs:
 - (m) In the case of a business who uses working animals, authorization to use working animals as contemplated in the Performing Animals Protection Amendment Act;
 - (n) a declaration by the applicant as security business, in the form approved by the Authority, that a member of the Service does not have any interest in the ownership of the business or exercise control, whether directly or indirectly, over the affairs of the security business;
 - (o) a declaration from the security business whether it is or intend to render a security service outside the borders of the Republic of South Africa and the details of such security services which includes but are not limited to recruitment, training or deployment. and
 - [(j) a tax clearance certificate from the South African Revenue Service, unless the director dispenses with this requirement for a sound reason after obtaining approval from the Council;

- (k) sufficient information in writing to enable the Authority to ascertain whether the applicant meets the requirements in regard to infrastructure and capacity necessary to render a security service as contemplated in section 23(2)(b) of the Act and regulation 5 of these regulations;]
- (p) <u>information on Broad Based Black Economic Empowerment</u>
 (B-BBEE) Status Level and any certification in respect thereof.
- [(l) a resolution by the applicant security business, in the form approved by the Authority, to apply for registration as a security service provider.]
- (3A) The applicant must submit satisfactory proof of registration that is in compliance with the Unemployment Insurance Act and Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act at least 60 days after registration, unless the applicant is not required to register and contribute in terms of these legislation;
- (3B) In the case of an applicant as security business who is licenced to possess firearms as contemplated in the Firearms Control Act, the applicant must submit a report in a format prescribed by the Authority within 10 days from the date of registration, detailing the following information
 - (i) the number of firearms licenced to the business; and
 - (ii) the respective make and calibre.
- f. by the substitution for paragraph (b) of sub-regulation (4) of the following paragraph:

- (b) the applicant demonstrates to the satisfaction of the director, through substantiated factual information, that the applicant is likely to commence with its business activities in rendering a security service within a period of 3 months after such registration or have commenced business activities following on from a provisional registration as contemplated in regulation 2A;
- g. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (c) of sub-regulation(4) of the following paragraph:
 - (d) The trading name of the business is approved by the Authority for purposes of registration as a security service provider and to be recorded in the register of security service provider as contemplated in section 24 of the Act and regulation 6 of these regulations.
- h. by the substitution for regulation (2) of the following subregulation:
 - (7) (a) No amount paid to the Authority by an applicant in terms of sub regulation (2)(a)(i), (2)(a)(ii), (3)(a)(i), regulation 5(2) and regulation 2A of these regulations, is refundable if the application for registration is withdrawn by the applicant or if the application is not approved by the Authority.
- by the insertion immediately after paragraph (a) of sub-regulation(7) of the following paragraph:
 - (aA) An amount paid to the Authority by any person intending to register or renew a registration of certificate in

terms of sub regulation (2)(a)(i), (2)(a)(ii), (3)(a)(i), regulation 5(2) and regulation 2A and 6A of these regulations, and an application which is not submitted in support of the amount paid within a period of 3 months, such an amount will be forfeited by the applicant and is not refundable by the Authority.

h. by the insertion immediately after Regulation (2) of the following regulation:

Provisional registration



- 2A. (1) An application for provisional registration as security service provider by a security business may be submitted to the director on the applicable form as prescribed by the Authority.
- (2) An application for provisional registration referred to in subregulation (1) must be accompanied by the following -
- (a) the relevant application fee as prescribed by the Authority;
- (b) furnish factually substantiated information in writing to the Authority on the nature and scope, including the geographical area of the applicant's intended and likely activities in rendering a security service for at least a period of 1 year after the commencing with its business activities; and
- (c) any required supporting documentation prescribed by the Authority in terms of the Act.
- (2) An application for provisional registration referred to in subregulation (1) is only applicable to new applicants as security businesses and is valid for a period of 6 months.

- (3) The Authority may withdraw the provisional registration of a security service provider unless such security service provider –
- (a) <u>is awarded a contract to render security services within a</u> <u>period of 6 months; or</u>
- (b) submits an application for an extension of 6 months to the provisional registration to the Authority prior the lapsing period.
- (4) In the case where the security service provider is awarded a contract to render a security service during the period of provisional registration, the security service provider must, within 10 days after being awarded the contract, apply for registration in terms of section 21 of the Act and these Regulations.
- (5) The Authority may require any person applying for registration as contemplated in sub-regulation 2(3), to apply for provisional registration first as contemplated in regulation 2A of these regulations.

Amendment of regulation 3 of the Regulations

- 3. Regulation 3 of the Regulations is hereby amended
 Training requirements for registration as a security service provider
 - a. by the deletion of sub-regulation (6) of the following sub-regulation:
 - [(6) The Authority performs its functions in terms of this regulation after such consultation with the South African Qualifications Authority, the Policing, Security, Legal and Correctional Services Sector Education and Training

Authority, or with any other statutory body, as the Authority may deem necessary.]

Amendment of regulation 4 of the Regulations

4. Regulation 4 of the Regulations is hereby amended -

Clearance certificate: ex-member of any official military, security, police or intelligence force or service

- a. by the substitution for paragraph (b) of sub-regulation (5) of the following paragraph:
 - (a) if it is reasonable to do so in the circumstances, and after complying with the provisions of regulation 2(8) of these regulations [and obtaining the consent of the Council] register the applicant as a security service provider if it considers the applicant a fit and proper person to render a security service.

Amendment of regulation 5 of the Regulations

5. Regulation 5 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Infrastructure and capacity necessary to render a security service

a. by the substitution for sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph (b) of sub-regulation (1) of the following sub-paragraph:

- (i) the applicant has at its disposal an administrative office, consisting of at least one room dedicated for this purpose, which must be an immovable structure or moveable structure with fixed or permanent floors, situated at a place that is reasonably accessible to the inspectors of the Authority, the clients of the security business and the security officers that are used by it to render a security service, and at which reasonable office hours are maintained;
- (iA) Notwithstanding the requirements in sub-paragraph (i), the Director may determine different requirements in respect of infrastructure.
- (ii) the applicant's administrative office contains all the equipment which is reasonably necessary for the effective management and administration of the affairs of the security business, on the basis of the information furnished in terms of the provisions of subregulation (1)(a), in accordance with the provisions of the Act, and, without limiting the generality of the aforesaid requirement, is serviced by [landline] telephone communication which includes a reliable facility to receive and transmit e-mails[facsimiles], and the office contains a hard copy or electronic filing system for the orderly keeping of all records and documents contemplated in regulation 10 of these regulations;
- [(iii) the applicant's administrative office may contain either a landline telephone and /or mobile communication as communication equipment for purposes of conducting business;]
- (iii[v]) the applicant's administrative office and internal systems meet any reasonable requirement that the Authority determines in terms of the Act;

- (iv) the applicant has at its disposal as many administrative offices satisfying the requirements of this regulation, as well as such other premises and physical facilities as may be reasonably necessary, in view of the nature, extent and geographical location of the applicant's activities;
- (v[i]) the affairs of the applicant are managed and controlled by appropriately experienced, trained or skilled persons;
- (vi[i]) the applicant has at its disposal a sufficient number of registered and appropriately trained and skilled security officers for the rendering of a security service for which it has contracted or is likely to contract;
- (vii[i]) the security officers used by the applicant in the rendering of a security service are properly controlled and supervised;
- ([ix]viii) the applicant has at its disposal a sufficient number of adequately skilled administrative staff members for the purpose of the administration of the affairs of the applicant in accordance with the provisions of the Act and any other applicable law;
- ([i]x) the applicant has at its disposal the financial means to ensure payment of the lawful wages to all the security officers and administrative staff used by it in connection with the rendering of a security service, as well as to ensure compliance with all its other statutory financial obligations;
- (x[i]) the applicant has all the necessary equipment, including vehicles and properly trained working animals, if applicable in the circumstances, as well as the uniforms, clothing and equipment that must be issued to its security officers in view of the nature of

their functions, at its disposal to enable it to render a proper security service for which it has contracted or is likely to contract; and

(xi[i]) the applicant is in lawful possession of the firearms and other weapons that are necessary to render the security service in respect of which it has contracted.

- b. by the insertion immediately after sub-regulation (1) of the following sub-regulation:
 - **1A**. The provisions of sub regulation 1(b) do not apply to a security business applying or provisional registration as contemplated in regulation 2A of these regulations.

Amendment of regulation 6 of the Regulations

6. Regulation 6 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Register of security service providers and related issues

a. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (a) of sub-regulation(1) of the following paragraph:

(bA) the provisional registration number on the registration certificate issued by the Authority as contemplated in regulation 6A of these regulations;

b. by the substitution for paragraph (b) of sub-regulation (1) of the following paragraph:

- (a) the date on the registration certificate referred to in paragraph (a) and the date of the renewal of the certificate as contemplated in regulation 6A of these regulations;
- c. by the insertion immediately after Regulation (6) of the following regulations:

Application for renewal of registration certificate



- **6A.** (1) The registration of a security service provider in terms of the Act lapses, subject to these regulations, on the first day following the expiry date, unless the registration certificate is renewed on or before the expiry date as contemplated in these regulations.
- (2) A security service provider who wishes to renew his or her registration certificate, must subject to these regulations, apply to the Authority for the renewal of registration certificate by submission of the duly completed application as determined by the Authority for this purpose.
- (3) The application form contemplated in sub-regulation (2) must be submitted to the director, subject to these regulations, not earlier than 60 days and not later than 21 days before the expiry date of the applicant's registration as a security service provider.
- (4) The duly completed application form submitted to the director in the case of an application for renewal of certificate by a natural person must be accompanied by the following –

- (a) payment of the relevant application fee;
- (b) an authenticated copy of the first page of the official identity document of the applicant or an authenticated copy of any other official document demonstrating the applicant's identity and South African citizenship;
- (c) an authenticated, recent, clear colour passport size photograph of the applicant or digital photo in the format approved by the Authority:
- (d) proof to the satisfaction of the Authority that an applicant who is not a South African citizen has permanent resident status in South Africa;
- (e) an original certificate or other proof acceptable to the Authority that the applicant complies with the relevant training requirements for registration as a security service provider as contemplated in any regulations made in respect of the obligatory undergoing of security training by security service providers unless the applicant has previously submitted such a certificate or other proof to the Authority;
- (f) a declaration or any other proof of employment within the security industry as determined by the director;
- (g) the original certificate of registration previously issued
 by the Authority or in the case where the previous
 certificate has been materially damaged, has been
 destroyed or lost, an affidavit explaining the
 circumstances in respect thereof; and

- (h) a valid undertaking regarding suretyship or guarantee contemplated in regulation 2(4)(c) of these regulations if the applicant is a person contemplated in section 21(1)(a)(iii), (iv), (v), (vi) or (vii) of the Act, and the applicant has not previously provided such an undertaking which will still be valid when the application for renewal of certificate is considered.
- (5) The duly completed application form submitted to the director in the case of an application for renewal of certificate by a security business, must be accompanied by the following –
- (a) a clear description of the security services the applicant wishes its renewal of certificate to be issued for as per the categories or classes of security services as contemplated in sub-regulation 1A;
- (b) payment of the relevant application fee, including the application fee for each category or class of registration as contemplated in sub-regulation 1A if the renewal of certificate application includes categories or classes of security services for which the business has not previously been registered for by the Authority;
- (c) duly completed applications for renewal as contemplated in regulation 6(3), accompanied by all the required supporting documentation, in respect of all persons referred to in section 21(1)(a)(ii), (iii), (iv), (v), (vi), or (vii) of the Act if such person's certificates require renewal.
- (d) The registration as security service providers and registration certificates of persons referred to in section 21 (1) of the Act, must be valid or have complied with renewal of

registration certificates in respect of their registrations as security service providers prior to their respective expiry dates.

- (e) the applicable documentation contemplated in regulation 2(3)(c), (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i) and (j) of these regulations unless the documentation has already been submitted to the Authority or unless there has been a change in the content of the documentation since its last submission;
- (f) notwithstanding the requirements of regulation 2(3)(e), a declaration and details as determined by the director in respect of the ownership and or control of the applicant security business of persons who are not South African citizens;
- (g) a design or photograph of the applicant's insignia, emblem, title or symbol whether on a uniform, vehicle or otherwise;
- (h) a photograph of the applicant's uniform, including any variations of the uniform depending on the particular category or class of security services rendered;
- (i) a tax clearance certificate not older than 30 days from the South African Revenue Service, unless the director dispenses with this requirement for a sound reason;
- (j) In the case of a business who uses working animals, authorization to use working animals as contemplated in the Performing Animals Protection Amendment Act;

- (k) a declaration by the applicant security business, in the form approved by the Authority, that a member of the Service does not have any interest in the ownership of the business or exercise control, whether directly or indirectly, over the affairs of the security business;
- (I) sufficient information in writing to enable the Authority to ascertain whether the applicant meets the requirements in regard to infrastructure and capacity necessary to render a security service as contemplated in section 23(2)(b) of the Act and regulation 5 of these regulations;
- (m) the original certificate of registration previously issued by the Authority or in the case where the previous certificate has been materially damaged, has been destroyed or lost, an affidavit explaining the circumstances in respect thereof; and
- (n) a declaration from the security business whether it renders or intend to render a security service outside the borders of the Republic of South Africa and the details of such security services which includes but are not limited to recruitment, training or deployment;
- (o) proof of the submission of compliance self-assessments as contemplated in regulation 10(A);
- (p) a resolution by the security business, in the form approved by the Authority, to apply for renewal of registration as a security service provider; and
- (q) Broad Based Black Economic Empowerment (B-BBEE) Status Level.

- (6) An applicant must furnish such additional information and documentation in connection with the application for renewal of certificate within such a period as the Authority may determine.
- (7) Despite the provisions of regulation 6(3)(e), the director of the Authority may at any stage before deciding on an application for renewal of certificate of registration, determine that an applicant, or a category or class of applicants, must undergo such assessment of their security training or qualifications as the director may deem necessary for the purposes of properly considering their applications for renewal of certificate(s) and in accordance to the Regulations for the Training of Security Service Providers.
- (8) the applicant must submit proof of registration and satisfactory proof that it is in compliance with the Unemployment Insurance Act and Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act, within 60 days after registration, if the applicant is required to register and contribute in terms of these legislation;
- (9) in the case of an applicant business who is licenced to possess firearms as contemplated in the Firearms Control Act, the applicant must submit a report in a format prescribed by the Authority within 10 days from the date of registration, detailing the following information –
- (i) the number of firearms licenced to the business:
- (ii) the respective make and calibre;

(iii) the number of firearms lost by, stolen from, transferred or destroyed in terms of the Firearms Control Act during the preceding 12 months from the date of submitting the application for renewal of registration certificate;

(iv) the number of instances and circumstances under which firearms were discharged by a security officer employed or deployed by the applicant security business during the preceding 12 months from the date of submitting the application for renewal of registration;

Consideration of application for renewal of registration certificate

- **6B**. (1) The Authority may, subject to these regulations, renew an applicant's registration certificate as security service provider if the applicant -
 - (a) complies with the requirements for registration as security service provider as contemplated in the Act;
 - (b) complies with the requirements for renewal as contemplated in these regulations;
 - (c) has paid the relevant application fee to the Authority;
 - (d) has paid any amount due and payable by the applicant to the Authority in terms of the Act, the Levies Act or any other cause of debt, or entered

- into an agreement with the Authority for the payment or partial payment of any amounts;
- (e) has successfully undergone any assessment determined by the director in terms of regulation 3(6):
- (f) has submitted compliance self-assessments as contemplated in regulation 11(A) of these regulations and has successfully undergone any desktop compliance inspection as determined by the director; and
- (g) is, based on the information available to the Authority, likely to comply with the Act and the Levies Act if the registration certificate is renewed.
- (2) The Authority must, in the form prescribed and on such conditions as it may determine, issue a new registration certificate in respect of each of the categories or classes of security services in which the security service provider is registered.
- (3) The Authority may refuse to renew an applicant's registration certificate if -
 - (a) the applicant does not meet the requirements contemplated in sub-regulation (1) or the other requirements in these regulations in respect of the renewal of the registration certificate;
 - (b) any of the grounds justifying the suspension of an applicant's registration contemplated in section

- 26(1) of the Act is present when the application is submitted or considered;
- (c) any of the grounds justifying withdrawal of the applicant's registration contemplated in section 26(4) of the Act is present when the application is submitted or considered;
- (d) the applicant is under investigation or being criminally prosecuted outside the Republic of South Africa or was found guilty of an offence outside the Republic of South Africa which corresponds to an offence specified in the Schedule to the Act, within a period of 10 years immediately before the submission of the application for renewal of a registration certificate;
- (e) when the application is submitted or considered, the applicant has been found guilty of improper conduct within a period of 5 years immediately before submitting the application for renewal of registration certificate or there is an enquiry pending into alleged improper conduct by the applicant;
- (f) the applicant, in the case of a security business, has applied for sequestration or liquidation and the application is still pending or has been granted;
- (g) the applicant, in the case of a security business registered as a company or close corporation is at

the time of the application under consideration for de-registration by the Registrar of Companies or Close Corporations; or

- (h) the applicant's registration as security service provider is suspended.
- (4) The Authority may, before the renewal of a registration certificate of a security business, cause any inspection to be held which it deems necessary to establish whether the applicant meets the prescribed requirements contemplated in section 23(2)(b) of the Act and regulation 5 of these regulations regarding infrastructure and capacity necessary to render a security service for the particular category or class of security service applied for, against payment by the applicant of the amount determined by the director for this purpose.
- (5) An applicant registered as a security officer and who has immigrated to South Africa during the 10 year period immediately preceding his or her application for renewal of certificate of registration or who has been resident outside South Africa for an uninterrupted period of at least 1 year during the 10 year period immediately preceding his or her application for renewal of his or her registration certificate, must submit an original police or other official clearance certificate on his or her criminal record status from every country outside South Africa where he or she has been resident within the relevant period, if these certificates have not been previously submitted to the Authority.
- (6) Despite any provision of these regulations, the director may on good cause shown and on grounds which are not in

conflict with the purpose of the Act and the objects of the Authority, and with due regard to the applicable policies and procedures approved by the Council for this purpose -

- (a) extend the period within which an application for renewal of a registration certificate, or any category or class of applications for renewal for a certificate, must be submitted;
- (b) condone the late submission of an application for renewal for a registration certificate;
- (c) grant a reasonable opportunity to an applicant to rectify any defect in an application for renewal of registration certificate;
- (d) grant a specified period to any applicant within which the applicant has to meet the requirements for renewal registration certificate, or extend such a period already granted;
- (e) <u>authorise a deviation from the procedure in</u> respect of the <u>submission and consideration of</u> applications for renewal;
- (f) postpone the consideration of an application, if there is a sound reason for such a step; or
- (g) renew the registration certificate of any applicant.

(7) No amount paid to the Authority by an applicant applying for the renewal of a registration certificate in terms of these regulations are refundable if the application for renewal is

withdrawn by the applicant or if the application is not approved by the Authority.

Effect of submission of application for renewal of registration certificate and extension of period for submission of application

- 6C. (1) If an application for renewal of a registration certificate has been submitted to the director in terms of these regulations, the registration of an applicant remains valid, subject to the Act and the Levies Act, until the application is decided by the Authority.
- (2) If the period within which an application for renewal of a registration certificate must be submitted has been extended in terms of regulation 6B(6)(a), the registration of the security service provider remains valid, subject to the Act and the Levies Act, until the date on which the application for renewal of registration certificate must be submitted to the Authority.

Pending applications for renewal of registration certificate

6D. (1) Every applicant for renewal of registration certificate whose application is lodged, or is pending, on the day immediately before the day when these amended regulations come into operation, must, subject to this sub-regulation, submit a duly completed and applicable application form as contemplated in regulation 6(A) of these regulations to the Authority to enable the Authority to consider the application in terms of the Act and these regulations.

- (2) An applicant contemplated in sub-regulation (1) must submit the duly completed application form to the Authority within 60 days after the date of promulgation of these regulations, or within such longer period as the Authority may allow for a sound reason.
- (3) The application for renewal of registration certificate by an applicant who does not submit the application form as provided for in this sub-regulation within the period allowed for this, or who withdraws the application, lapses, and the Authority will not have to refund any amount paid by the applicant in respect of the application or to take such amount into account when the applicant lodges a new application.

Refusal to grant application for renewal of registration certificate

- **6E**. (1) If the Authority decides to refuse an application for renewal of a registration certificate, a notice from the director to this effect must be served on applicant and the applicant's registration as a security service provider lapses subject to the Act, on the date of such notice.
- (2) An applicant who feels aggrieved by a decision of the Authority to refuse the application for renewal of registration certificate may appeal against such decision as though there has been a refusal by the Authority to register the applicant as a security service provider as contemplated in section 30(1)(a) of the Act.
- (3) Pending a decision on an appeal lodged in terms of subregulation (2), an applicant may not render a security service unless the prior written approval of the director has been

obtained, which may be granted on such conditions, including conditions on the payment of the applicable prescribed amounts or levies to the Authority in terms of the applicable legislation, as the director may deem appropriate in the circumstances.

- (4) A security service provider whose application for renewal of registration certificate has been refused or registration has lapsed must forthwith return to the Authority any certificate of registration if it has not been handed in as contemplated in regulation 9A(3)(g) in the case of a security officer or 9A(4)(n) and all certificate(s) of identification issued in terms of Section 25 of the Act and regulation 9(3A) of these regulations.
 - (5) A security service provider who contravene or fails to comply with sub regulations (4) is guilty of an offence and subject to the penalties as contemplated in Section 38 (3) (iii) of the Act.

<u>Determination of application fees for renewal of registration certificates</u>

6F. (1) The director may, with the concurrence of the Council and subject to the provisions of the Levies Act, determine the application fees as contemplated in regulations 6B (4)(a) and 6B (5)(b) and may also determine different fees with reference to different categories or classes of applicants and certificates contemplated in section 25 of the Act issued in respect thereof.

Amendment of regulation 7 of the Regulations

7. Regulation 7 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Change of name and status of security service provider

a. by the insertion immediately after Regulation (7) of the following regulation:

The Information to be submitted by security service providers

7A. (1) A security service provider must, in the case of a security business, on or before 1 March of each year -

- (a) provide the Authority with information on any accident as defined in the Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Amendment Act, 1997 (Act No. 61 of 1997) and the circumstances relating to the injury, illness or death of an employee;
- (b) provide the Authority with information relating to the number of people with disabilities, as defined in the Employment Equity Act, 1998 (Act No. 55 of 1998) as amended, employed as well as the nature of their employment; and
- (c) a description of its Broad Based Black Economic Empowerment (B-BBEE) Status Level and any certification in respect thereof.
- (2) In the case of a security business who is licenced to possess firearms as contemplated in the Firearms Control Act, 2000 (Act No. 60 of 2000) -

- (a) <u>details of practical training undergone by security</u> officers issued with firearms; and
- (b) details of any briefing session attended by security officers issued with firearms on the relevant legal aspects and procedures and of their legal duties regarding the possession, carrying, safekeeping and use of firearms and ammunition.
- (c) inform the director of the Authority within 10 days
 after the discharge of a firearm by a security officer,
 providing the particulars within the knowledge of the
 security business and includes
 - (i) the name and registration number of the security officer discharging the firearm;
 - (ii) <u>details of the training and competency of the security</u> <u>officer;</u>
 - (iii) a copy of the permit or legal authorization issued by the security business to the security officer to be in possession of the firearm;
 - (iv) full particulars of the firearm and ammunition;
 - the date, time, place and circumstances pertaining to the discharge of the firearm;
 - (vi) particulars of any damage, injury or death caused by the discharge of the firearm;

- (vii) the date, time, place and details of the police station where the case was reported, including the case reference number from the police station; and
- (viii) any further relevant facts regarding the incident.
- (3) submit a declaration from the security business whether it is rendering, or intends to render a security service, outside the borders of the Republic of South Africa and the details of such security services which includes -
 - (a) the recruitment, training, hiring out, sending or deployment of other persons to render a security service outside the Republic; and
 - (b) <u>details of any firearms used in the rendering of security services outside of the Republic.</u>
- (4) report information of any criminal complaints and investigations relating to the security business or any information that is known by the security business on any criminal complaints or investigations of any of its security officers that were reported by any person to the South African Police Service and the details of the compliant or allegations, case reference number and police station.
- (5) Every person referred to in section 21(1)(a)(ii), (iii), (iv), (v), (vi), or (vii) of the Act must take all practical steps within his or her powers, capacity or functions to ensure that the security business complies with all the obligations in terms of this regulation.
- (6) Any security business or person contemplated in sub-regulation (2) who -

- (a) contravenes or fails to comply with a provision of this regulation; and
- (b) <u>intentionally or negligently provides any false information in com-plying or purportedly complying with any duty provided for in this regulation;</u>

is guilty of an offence and on conviction liable to a fine or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding 24 months, or to both a fine and such imprisonment.

Amendment of regulation 8 of the Regulations

8. Regulation 8 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Change with regard to information submitted to the Authority

- a. by the substitution for paragraph (b) of sub-regulation (1) of the following paragraph:
 - (b) must, in the case of a security business, annually during **[November]** March submit a return to the Authority with the information required on the form approved by the Authority for this purpose.

Amendment of regulation 9 of the Regulations

9. Regulation 9 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Certificates of registration, identification and appointment

a. by the substitution for sub-regulation (1) of the following regulation:

- 9.(1) The certificate of registration contemplated in section 25 of the Act, renewal of certificate for registration or certificate of provisional registration must contain the name and registration number of the security service provider, or such further information as the Authority may determine and the seal of the office of the director.
- b. by the insertion immediately after sub regulation (1) of the following sub regulation:
- (1A) The certificate contemplated in regulation 9 (1) may be in an electronic format as approved by the Authority and may be accessible on the Authority's website and other digital platforms as the Authority may determine, and used as proof of registration or provisional registration by security service providers.
- c. by the substitution for sub regulation (2) of the following sub regulation:
- (2) The certificate of identification contemplated in section 25 of the Act is in the form of a credit card, includes a photograph of the security service provider, contains the name and registration number of the security service provider, the name of the security business who employs the security officer and such further information as the Authority may determine.
- d. by the insertion immediately after sub regulation (2) of the following sub regulation:
- (2A) The certificate of identification contemplated in sub regulation (2) must be applied for by the security business who employ a security officer within a period of 10 days after such

employment in the prescribed manner and after payment of the relevant application fee as prescribed by the Authority.

- (2B) In the case of an independent security service provider, the application contemplated in sub-regulation (2) must be applied for by such independent security service provider directly to the Authority.
- (2C) A person contemplated in section 21(1)(a)(iii), (iv), (v), (vi) or (vii) of the Act must ensure compliance with the obligation as contemplated in sub regulation 2A.
- ([4]3) The certificate of appointment of an inspector of the Authority contemplated in section 31(3) of the Act, must comply with every applicable requirement prescribed in terms of section 334(3)(b) of the Criminal Procedure Act, 1977 (Act No. 51 of 1977), must contain the statement that the inspector is a peace officer for the national territory of the Republic for the purpose of exercising the powers contemplated in sections 40, 41, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49 and 56 of the Criminal Procedure Act, and must contain the name and address of the Authority, a photograph of the inspector, the name of the inspector and such further particulars as determined by the Authority.
- ([5]4) The Authority may, on application of a security service provider and after payment of the amount determined by the Authority for this purpose, issue a new certificate of registration or a new certificate of identification to the security service provider if the Authority is satisfied that the original certificate has been materially damaged, has been destroyed, has been lost, when the circumstances contemplated in regulation 7 of these regulations are present, when registration is renewed as contemplated in

section 22 of the Act, or when there is some other sound reason for issuing a new certificate.

(**[6]**<u>5</u>) A security service provider must always carry his or her certificate of identification when he or she is rendering a security service or wearing the uniform of a security business in public and must immediately produce the certificate when requested to do so by a member of the Service, an inspector of the Authority, a client to whom the security service provider is rendering a security service, a person authorized by such client in writing, or by any other person with a legitimate interest to ascertain the registration status and identity of the security service provider.

d. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (b) of sub regulation(6) of the following paragraph:

(bA) is a person contemplated in section 21(1)(a)(iii), (iv), (v), (vi) or (vii) of the Act and who did not ensure compliance with the obligation as contemplated in sub regulation (2A); or

Amendment of regulation 10 of the Regulations

10. Regulation 10 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Keeping of records and documents

a. by the insertion immediately after paragraph (k) of sub-regulation(7) of the following paragraph:

(kA) In the case of a business who is licensed to possess firearms as contemplated in the Firearms Control Act, a register with the details of –

- (a) the number of firearms licenced to the business;
- (b) the respective make and calibre;
- (c) the number of firearms lost by, stolen from, transferred or destroyed in terms of the Firearms Control Act;
- (d) the number of instances and circumstances under which firearms were discharged by a security officer employed or deployed by the applicant security business; and
- b. by the insertion immediately after sub-regulation (8) of the following regulation:

Compliance self-assessment by security businesses

- 10A. (1) A security business registered with the Authority must conduct a formal compliance self-assessment on an annual basis in the format provided by the Authority.
 - (2) The compliance self-assessment referred to in sub regulation 10A(1) must be submitted to the Authority within a period of 10 days.
 - (2) Despite the provision of sub-regulation (2), the director may on good cause shown extend the period within which a compliance self-assessment must be submitted.

- (3) The compliance self-assessment must be signed by the responsible official of the business providing his or her full names and surname and the official capacity within the business on all pages of the compliance self assesment report.
- (4) Every person referred to in section 21(1)(a)(ii), (iii), (iv), (v), (vi) or (vii) of the Act must take all reasonably practicable steps within his or her powers, capacity or functions to ensure that the security business in question comply with all the obligations contained in these regulations.

 - a. by the insertion before the definition of "security service provider" of the following definition:

"witness subpoena" means a written order that requires a person to appear before an enquiry, or other legal proceedings, and testify, or produce documentation.

Amendment of Regulation 8 of the Regulations

2. Regulation 8 of the Regulations is hereby amended-

Witnesses and related matters

- a. by the substitution of subregulation (1) of the following regulation:
 - (1) The director may, under his or her signature, [summon] subpoena any person to appear at an enquiry, at a date, time and place referred to in the [summons] witness subpoena, to give evidence and to produce at the enquiry any document referred to in the [summons] witness subpoena, which may be relevant to the enquiry, and which is, or presumably is, in the possession of the person in question.
- b. by the substitution of subregulation (2) of the following regulation:
 - (2) [A summons] A witness subpoena referred to in subregulation (1) is in the form materially corresponding to the Annexure, as determined by the [that the] director [determines] from time to time.
- c. by the substitution of subregulation (3) of the following regulation:
 - (3) A respondent who wishes a person to be [summoned] subpoenaed to present evidence at an enquiry must, with the written permission of a presiding officer, draft, sign and serve a [summons] witness subpoena, accompanied by the written permission in question, substantially in the form that the director determines from time to time, on such person.
- d. by the substitution of paragraph (b) of subregulation (4) of the following regulation:
 - (b) issue **[a summons]** the witness subpoena in the form contemplated in subregulation (2) in respect of a person who is not present at an enquiry and who, in the opinion of the presiding officer, may be able to give evidence relevant to the enquiry, to attend the enquiry, give evidence at the enquiry, and to produce any document which may be relevant to the enquiry which is, or presumably is, in the possession of such person, at the enquiry.

- e. by the substitution of subregulation (5) of the following regulation
 - (5) A directive of the presiding officer as referred to in subregulation (4)(a), has for all the purposes of these Regulations the effect of [a summons] the witness subpoena contemplated in subregulation (4)(b).
- f. by the substitution of subregulation (3) of the following regulation:
 - (6) The presiding officer may at the time adjournment of an enquiry direct any person attending the enquiry as a witness and who has to be present when the enquiry resumes, to be present at the enquiry at a date, time and place determined by the presiding officer, and such directive has all the purposes of these Regulations the effect of [a summons] the witness subpoena contemplated in subregulation (4)(b).

Amendment of Regulation 15 of the Regulations

15 Imposition of penalties, payment and collection of fines and other amounts

Amendment of Regulation 15 of the Code of Conduct

- a. by the substitution for paragraph (a) of subregulation (2) of the following paragraph:
 - (2) (a) Where a fine has been imposed on a respondent and, where necessary, has been confirmed in terms of regulation 18, the fine is, subject to paragraph (b), due and payable to the Authority [on demand] upon service of notification of Improper Conduct Enquiries outcome, irrespective of the fact that the respondent has lodged an appeal as contemplated in section 30(1)(c) of the Act against the conviction or the fine in question.

- b. by the insertion of paragraph (c) and (d) under subregulation 2 of the regulations:
 - (c) A respondent who is unable to pay a fine in terms of subparagraph (a) and intends to lodge an appeal must furnish the Authority with an affidavit confirming that the respondent is unable to pay the imposed fine upfront.
 - (d) The Authority may grant consent for the respondent to proceed with the appeal without payment of the imposed fine, if the respondent has furnished sufficient reasons and attached relevant proof of inability to pay the imposed fine, such as the respondent's bank statement (not older than 3 months) or financial audited statement to the affidavit made in terms of paragraph (c).
- c. by the insertion of subregulation 2A after paragraph (c) of subregulation 2 of the regulations:
 - 2A (1) Payment of a fine must be made by the respondent to the Authority by paying the full amount due immediately by means of an electronic transfer (EFT) into the bank account of the Authority as indicated on the notification of the Improper Conduct Enquiry outcome or the settlement agreement.
 - (2) If payment of a fine remains dishonoured by any respondent for a period exceeding thirty days after service of the notification of Improper Conduct Enquiries outcome by the Authority, the Authority will be entitled to institute legal proceedings to enforce compliance with the outcomes of the improper conduct enquiry.
 - (3) Where a respondent is unable to settle the fine amount in a single payment, the respondent is required to approach the Authority within a period of thirty days after receipt of notification of outcome of improper conduct enquiry to make payment arrangements.

(4) The payment arrangements in terms of subregulation (3) will entail signing of an acknowledgement of debt.

Short title and commencement

6. These regulations are called the Draft Improper Conduct Enquiries Amendment Regulations, 2022, and come into operation, unless otherwise specified, on the date of their publication in the *Gazette*.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS the Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority is established for purposes of regulating the private security industry and to exercise effective control over the practice of the occupation of security service provider in the public and national interest and the interest of the private security industry itself;

AND WHEREAS service providers play an important role in protecting and safeguarding persons and properties, including security services rendered at any South African port facility and on or near South African ships;

AND WHEREAS the Minister of Police deems it necessary to make regulations relating to any matter which in terms of the Act is required or permitted to be prescribed in or in connection with the rendering of security services.

Be it published, therefore, the draft regulations contained in this Schedule for comment by interested persons.

CHAPTER 1

PURPOSE, INTERPRETATION, APPLICATION AND DEFINITIONS

Definitions

1. In these regulations any word or expression to which a meaning has been assigned in the Act will bear the meaning so assigned and, unless the context indicates otherwise –

"ISPS Code" means the International Ship and Port Facility Security Code as contained in Chapter XI-2 of the Safety of Life at Sea Convention of 1974 as amended;

"maritime industry participant" means—

- (a) a port operator;
- (b) a port facility operator;
- (c) the ship operator for a South African regulated ship;
- (d) the ship operator for a foreign regulated ship;
- (e) a contractor who provides services to a person mentioned in paragraphs (a) to (d); or
- (f) a port service provider, as defined in the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations;
- "maritime security plan" means a maritime security plan as defined in regulation 3 of the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations;
- "Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations" means the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations, 2004 made in terms of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1951 (Act No. 57 of 1951);
- "National Ports Act" means the National Ports Act, 2005 (Act No. 12 of 2005);

- "port facility" means an area of land or water, or land and water, within a security regulated port (including any buildings, installations or equipment in or on the area), that—
- (a) is used either wholly or partly in connection with the loading or unloading of security regulated ships; and
- (b) is identified as a port facility in the map that in, terms of regulation 46(2) of the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations, must accompany the maritime security plan for the security regulated port;
- "port facility security officer" means the person designated as responsible for the development, implementation, revision and maintenance of the port facility security plan and for liaison with the ship security officers and company security officers, in terms of the ISPS Code;
- "South African Maritime Safety Act" means the South African Maritime Safety Act, 1998 (Act No. 5 of 1998);
- "ship security officer" means the person on board the ship, accountable to the master, designated by the Company as responsible for the security of the ship, including implementation and maintenance of the ship security plan and for liaison with the company security officer and port facility security officers, in terms of the ISPS Code;
- "ship security plan" means a plan developed to ensure the application of measures on board the ship designed to protect persons on board, cargo, cargo transport units, ships' stores or the ship from the risks of a security incident.
- "South African ship" includes an unregistered ship having South African nationality in terms of the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations;
- "South African waters" means the internal and territorial waters of the Republic as defined in the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations, 2004:

"the Act" means the Private Security Industry Regulation Act, 2001 (Act No. 56 of 2001); and

"the Authority" means the Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority.

Purpose and interpretation

- (1) The purpose of these regulations is to ensure that any person providing or intending to provide security services on behalf of a shipping company or at any port facility in South Africa –
- is registered with the Authority and trained in line with any applicable legislation and international standards;
- (b) performs security services duties within their powers and in line with any applicable legislation and international standards;
- (c) develops ship security plans and port facility plans in line with the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations and the ISPS Code;
- (d) conducts security risk assessment for purposes of identifying threats and implementing security measures to ensure the safety and security of persons and property;
- (e) reports any incident that occurs while performing their duties, within the period specified in these regulations; and
- (f) does not carry or use firearms unless it is legally permitted to do so.
- (2) These regulations must be interpreted in accordance with their purpose and in a manner consistent with the Act, the South African Maritime Safety Act, Merchant Shipping Act; the National Ports Act; and any other legislation regulating security service providers in the maritime industry.

Application

- 3. These regulations apply to -
- (a) any person, practising the occupation of security service provider in the maritime industry, particularly those providing security services on behalf of a shipping company or at any port facility in South Africa, for

purposes of and in connection with rendering a security service or carrying on business as a security service provider in terms of the Act; and

(b) any person using his or her own employees as ship security officers or port security officers in connection with the rendering of security services on behalf of a shipping company or at any port facility in South Africa, to the extent provided for in the Act and these regulations.

CHAPTER 2

Requirements pertaining to the rendering of security services in the maritime sector

General functions of the Authority pertaining to persons rendering security services on behalf of shipping companies or at any port facility in South Africa

- 4. (1) The Authority shall for the purpose exercising effective control over persons rendering security services on behalf of shipping companies or at any port facility South Africa and in accordance with the Act, these regulations and other applicable laws and international standards –
 - (a) determine the requirements and rules for security service providers in the maritime industry; and
 - (b) enter into agreements with or obtain the assistance of any relevant person, institution or organ of state to conduct or assist it in conducting any investigation or perform any function in terms of these regulations.

Security service provider appointed to provide security services on board the ship within the South African waters or at port facilities

- (1) The security business appointing any person as a security officer for purposes of performing security services on board the ship within the South African waters or at a port facility must ensure that such person
 - (a) is registered with the Authority as security service provider in terms of the Act; and
 - (b) has completed security training in terms of the Act the relevant training in respect of ship procedures and port facility operations.
 - (2) The security business must ensure that the security officer referred to in sub-regulation (1) performs his or her security duties as specified in the contract of employment between the maritime industry participant and the security business.

Ship security plan and maritime security plan

- 6. (1) A security business that is appointed for purposes of providing security services on behalf of a shipping company or at a port facility must appoint a person who is responsible for preparing and compiling a ship security plan or maritime security plan.
 - (2) The person responsible for compiling a ship security plan or port facility plan appointed in terms of sub-regulation (1) must be registered with the Authority as security service provider in terms of the Act.
 - (3) The person responsible for compiling the ship security plan or maritime security plan must do so in liaison with the ship operator or any other relevant maritime industry participant contracting the security business.
 - (4) The security business must submit the security ship plan or maritime security plan to the relevant industry maritime participant for approval, upon the finalisation of such plan.

(5) The security business must ensure that ship security plans and maritime security plans are prepared and compiled in accordance with the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations.

Security risk assessment

- 7. (1) A security business that is appointed for purposes of providing security services on behalf of a shipping company or at a port facility must appoint a person who is responsible for conducting a security risk assessment to assess possible risk or threat level that may be associated with the operation of the ship or the port facility.
 - (2) The person responsible for compiling a ship security plan or port facility plan appointed in terms of sub-regulation (1) must be registered with the Authority as security service provider in terms of the Act.
 - (3) The person contemplated in sub-regulation (2) must be in possession of an accredited NQF qualification in Risk Management and have at least 2 years' experience in the maritime industry, including adequate knowledge of ship or port operations.
 - (4) The security risk assessment must be conducted in liaison with the relevant maritime industry participant contracting such security business and it must be included in the ship security plan or maritime security plan.

Prohibition of use or carrying of firearms

8. (1) A security business that is appointed by any maritime industry participant for purposes of providing security services whether on board or near the ship within the South African waters or at a port facility, is prohibited from using or carrying on the premises where such services are rendered, except in circumstances where the contract of employment between the security business and maritime industry

participant stipulates the need for using or carrying firearms for performing particular duties.

Security Equipment

- 9. (1) A security business that is appointed by any maritime industry participant to render security services which requires the use of certain security equipment, must comply with the requirements as prescribed by the Authority.
 - (2) A person responsible for the use or monitoring of any security equipment utilised by the shipping company or the maritime industry participant must ensure that he or she reports any fault that occur or may occur and interferes with performing security services to the maritime industry participant or relevant person as soon as practically possible.

Reporting incidents to the Authority

- 10. (1) A security business providing security services on behalf of a shipping company board the ship or at a port facility must report any incident, injury, harm, damage or death of a person occurred during the rendering of security services to the Authority in writing, within a period of 10 days.
 - (2) In addition to the provisions of sub-regulation (1), the security business must comply with the Merchant Shipping (Maritime Security) Regulations in respect of reporting maritime security incidents.

Conducting inspections in the maritime sector

11. (1) An inspector of the Authority may, in exercising his or her powers in terms of section 34 of the Act, conduct an inspection in respect of persons providing security services on behalf of shipping companies or

at any South African port facilities, for purposes of ensuring compliance with these regulations.

CHAPTER 3

GENERAL PROVISIONS

12. Offences and penalties

- (1) Any person providing security service in terms of these regulations who
- (a) renders maritime security services without being registered in terms of the Act;
- renders maritime security services in terms of these regulations that fall outside his or her powers;
- (c) fails to compile a ship security plan or maritime security plan contemplated in regulation (6);
- (d) fails to conduct risk assessment contemplated in regulation (7);
- (e) carries or uses a firearm when providing maritime security services without legal authorization;
- (f) fails to report incidents to the Authority as contemplated in regulation(10);

is guilty of an improper conduct as contemplated in regulation 24 of the Code of Conduct and on conviction liable to penalties as contemplated in regulation 25 of the Code of Conduct.

Transitional Provisions

13. Every person deemed to have been registered as a security service provider and providing security service on behalf of a shipping company or at any port facility in South Africa, must within a period of 180 days from the date of promulgation of these Regulations, or within such period as the Director may allow on the basis of a substantiated written application by such security service provider within a period of

60 days from the date of promulgation of these Regulations, comply with these regulations.

Short title and commencement

14. These regulations are called Draft Regulations Relating to Security Service Providers Rendering Security Services in the Maritime Sector, 2021, and come into operation, unless otherwise specified, on the date of their publication in the *Gazette*.

Regulation 28(1) of the Deposit Insurance Regulations of 2024 (Regulations) requires a bank to submit its total qualifying deposits and total covered deposits to the Corporation for Deposit Insurance (CODI) on a monthly basis, using month-end balances, in the manner and form prescribed by CODI.

Regulation 39(1) of the Regulations specifies that CODI may, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, specify the form as well as the content of reporting and submitting information in terms of the Regulations.

In accordance with the provisions of regulation 39(1) read with regulation 28(1) of the Regulations, CODI hereby gives notice of the requirements for monthly data submissions.

The requirements for monthly data submissions as set out in the attached Schedule are applicable from 1 April 2024.

2. Data submission format

Banks must submit the required data fields to CODI in a comma-separated value (CSV) data format.

3. Data submission period

To facilitate a smooth transition into reporting, a distinction is made between the first data submission period and the business-as-usual data submission period.

3.1 First data submission period

- 3.1.1 Banks must submit their total qualifying deposits², total covered deposits³ and the applicable declarations⁴ to CODI within 10 working days starting from 1 April 2024.
- 3.1.2 The first data submission must be based on the March 2024 month-end balances.

3.2 Business-as-usual data submission period

- 3.2.1 The business-as-usual data submission period is the standard requirement that banks must adhere to in all the months following the first data submission period, i.e. for all the monthly balance submissions starting with the end of April 2024 submissions.

Chapter V of the Deposit Insurance Regulations of 2024 (Regulations) requires banks to submit declarations to CODI on a monthly basis in order to fulfil the compliance and oversight requirements of the Regulations.

5.1 Submission of declarations

- 5.1.1 Banks must upload their declarations on CODI's IT system in the Portable Document Format (PDF).
- 5.1.2 If a bank is not able to submit the declaration(s) on CODI's IT system, then the declaration(s) must be emailed to CODISupport@resbank.co.za within three (3) working days of submitting the data to CODI.
- 5.1.3 Where applicable, banks must submit Declaration A1⁵ within 10 working days immediately following the month-end to which the data submission relates.

6. Data resubmissions and declarations

Data resubmissions occur when a bank resubmits information that has already been submitted to CODI. All data resubmissions must be accompanied by the applicable declarations as required by Chapter V of the Regulations.

CAPE FLORA / FYNBOS INDUSTRY APPLICATION FOR THE CONTINUATION OF STATUTORY MEASURES ON FYNBOS CUT-FLOWER PRODUCTS EXPORTED (EXPORT COLD CHAIN PRODUCTS ONLY)

NAMC REQUESTING COMMENTS / INPUTS FROM DIRECTLY AFFECTED GROUPS

On 8 March 2024, Cape Flora SA (CFSA) applied, in terms of the Marketing of Agricultural Products Act (MAP Act) 1996, on behalf of the fynbos cut-flower industry (fynbos industry) for the continuation of statutory measures (levies, records & returns and registration) on exported fynbos products. The current statutory measures on fynbos expires on 11 September 2024.

CFSA requested that the following statutory measures be approved for a new 4 (four) year period with effect from 1 October 2024, namely -

- o Section 15 of the Marketing of Agricultural Products Act (MAP Act): Levies;
- o Section 18 of the MAP Act: Records and returns; and
- Section 19 of the MAP Act: Registration.

The purpose and objective of the proposed statutory measures are as follows:

- The payment of the levy, in terms of section 15 of the MAP Act, will be used to finance the following functions:
 - Technical research (30%);
 - Information, statistics and training (10%);
 - Transformation and training (20%);
 - Market access, development and communication (30%); and
 - Administration (10%).

The MAP Act stipulates that a statutory levy may not exceed 5% of the price realised for a specific agricultural product at the first point of sale. The maximum of 5% must be based on a guideline price calculated as the average price at the first point of sale over a period not exceeding three years. The 2024/25 proposed average statutory levy level of R2,81 per standard export carton, is less than 1% of the calculated average guideline price for fynbos per carton and is therefore well within the limit of 5%.

- Submitting records and returns, in terms of section 18 of the MAP Act and Registration in terms of section 19 of the MAP Act
 - Submitting records and returns to CFSA and registration with CFSA will ensure the availability and provision of continuous, timeous and accurate information relating to the products indicated above, to all stakeholders in the industry deemed to be essential to ensure informed decision making and a stable and profitable industry.

CFSA indicated that no records or returns shall be required in terms of this measure which discloses confidential information of a marketing nature, and in particular, no returns disclosing, *inter alia*, contracting parties; purchasers of fynbos; prices of services or the prices obtained for fynbos, or any similar information.

By combining compulsory registration with the keeping of information and the rendering of returns on an individual basis, generic information for the whole of the industry can be processed and disseminated and will form the basis for the collection of levies where applicable and appropriate.

It is proposed that CFSA, a non-profit company established in terms of the Companies Act (as amended), 2008 (Act 71 of 2008), implement and administer the proposed statutory measures. The statutory levies for CFSA will be accounted for separately from other funds and activities within CFSA, in accordance with the prescriptions of the NAMC and the Auditor General.

The NAMC believes that the statutory measures requested are consistent with the objectives of the MAP Act (as set out in section 2 of the Act).

Directly affected groups (e.g. exporters, agents, producers and packers) in the fynbos industry are kindly requested to submit any comments, in writing, regarding the proposed statutory measures, to the NAMC (e-mail to mathildavdw@namc.co.za) on or before 12 April 2024, to enable the Council to finalise its recommendation to the Minister in this regard.
