EXTRAORDINARY GAZETTES

3. Extraordinary Gazettes can have only one publication date. If multiple publications of an Extraordinary Gazette are required, a separate Z95/Z95Prov Adobe Forms for each publication date must be submitted.

Notice Submission Process

- Download the latest Adobe form, for the relevant notice to be placed, from the Government Printing Works website www.gpwonline.co.za.
- 5. The *Adobe* form needs to be completed electronically using *Adobe Acrobat / Acrobat Reader*. Only electronically completed *Adobe* forms will be accepted. No printed, handwritten and/or scanned *Adobe* forms will be accepted.
- 6. The completed electronic *Adobe* form has to be submitted via email to submit.egazette@gpw.gov.za. The form needs to be submitted in its original electronic *Adobe* format to enable the system to extract the completed information from the form for placement in the publication.
- Every notice submitted must be accompanied by an official GPW quotation. This must be obtained from the eGazette Contact Centre.
- 8. Each notice submission should be sent as a single email. The email **must** contain **all documentation relating** to a particular notice submission.

QUOTATIONS

- 13. Quotations are valid until the next tariff change.

CANCELLATIONS

- 21. Cancellation of notice submissions are accepted by **GPW** according to the deadlines stated in the table above in point 2. 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Language Policy

1. DEFINITIONS AND ACRONYMS

1.1 <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

Development of a language	The promotion of a language by graphisation, standardisation and elaboration of functions so that the language can be used in the media, education, legal and administrative systems, etc.; and by generally providing scope for the publication of literary works in that language.
Employee	a. Any person other than an independent contractor who works for another person or for the State and who receives, or is entitled to receive, any remuneration; and b. In any manner assists in carrying on or conducting the business of an employee.
Historically disadvantaged languages	In the South African context, these are the languages that were assigned low status by previous regime and as a result were not used in the media, education (after early primary school), or in public or economically significant domains. Little support was also given to the development of verbal art forms in these languages. They included indigenous languages, heritage languages and SASL.
Head Office	The National Head Office of the Department
Indigenous language	A language native to a country.
Interpreting	The act of transposing an utterance from the source language into a target language in spoken form.
Language awareness	Sensitivity to how language is used in society, whether the users are accorded their language rights, and how language is used to empower or disempower or are centralised or marginalised in the public domain.
Language equity	The fairness of language provision and/or treatment of two or more languages. Matters such as the number of speakers and the status of a language may require policy to determine the domains of use of a particular language. This use may not be necessarily equal.
Language policy	An official decision/decree on how various languages spoken in heterogeneous/multilingual communities should be used in the public domain.
Language rights	Laws which allow citizens to use the languages of their choice.
Language units	A function in the department and provinces which deal with specific language issues of that department and/or province arising from the National Language Unit and which liaise with other departments on language matters especially through the National Language Forum (NLF).
Sign language	A sign language (also signed language) is a language which, instead of acoustically conveyed sound patterns, uses manual communication and body language to convey meaning. This can involve simultaneously combining hand shapes, orientation and movement of the hands, arms or body, and facial expressions to fluidly express a speaker's thoughts.

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Marginalised language	Any official language that is excluded from official use or the use of which is discouraged in formal settings (e.g. education, health care)."Marginalised" usually implies the low status of the language and possibly the speakers. Language Policy

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3. PURPOSE

The purposes of developing a language policy are to ensure that DPW provides effective service delivery to the citizens of South Africa through meaningful access to its services and promotes knowledge of, respect and use of the formerly marginalised official languages of the country.

The Department of Public Works (DPW) has developed a Language Policy to promote historically disadvantaged languages as well as to:

- 3.1 Promote the equitable use of the 11 official languages
- 3.2 Facilitate equitable access to the DPW's services, knowledge and information by its clients;
- 3.3 Ensure redress for the previously marginalised official indigenous languages;
- 3.4 Promote good language management for efficient service delivery to meet client expectations and needs;
- 3.5 Promote the practice of language rights, indigenous language equity and language awareness.

The policy would enable DPW to expedite access to government communications and information and fast track service delivery to internal and external clients.

4. BACKGROUND

Pre-1994, DPW used only English and Afrikaans as official languages of communication. Post-1994 elections, the multilingual character of South Africa recognised official eleven languages. They were isiNdebele, isiXhosa, isiZulu and siSwati (referred to as the Nguni language group); Sesotho, Sepedi and Setswana (referred to as the Sotho language group); Tshivenda, Xitsonga, English and Afrikaans. Furthermore, Section 6 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 provides for 11 official languages and requires the State to take practical and positive measures to elevate the status and advance the use of indigenous languages. The Constitution further requires all official languages to enjoy parity of esteem and treated equitably.

The Use of Official Languages Act (Act No. 12 of 2012) gives impetus to this section and requires National Government Departments, National Public Entities and National Public Enterprises to develop and adopt departmental language policies to give expression to the recognition of 11 official languages and promote linguistic diversity in post-apartheid South Africa.

5. PROBLEM STATEMENT

DPW is a National Department that has eleven regional offices. The clientele of the DPW constitutes of diverse, multilingual societies. It is important that respect for language rights and broad acceptance of linguistic diversity should be encouraged to build a united DPW.

6. SCOPE OF APPLICATIONS

This policy applies to all DPW National and Regional offices, all its (DPW) employees and members of the public who interact with the Department.

7. NATURE OF DPW

DPW is the custodian of the state built environment, state immovable asset portfolio and a driver of the national goal of job creation and poverty alleviation through the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP).

8. USAGE

8.1 Gradual implementation of the policy

The application of the language policy must be phased in on a quarterly basis: first in the national office and then in the regional offices.

8.2 OFFICIAL LANGUAGES

The adopted official languages of the DPW are **isiZulu**, **Sepedi and English**. This choice is guided by the regulations of the use of official languages and the results of the 2011 Census.

- 8.2.1 Working Language for Internal Communication: English will be used as the main language of correspondence within the department especially in Department budgeting, tenders and strategic planning.
- 8.2.2 Working Language for External Communication: English will be used as a language of communication between the Regional Offices and the Head Office. At regional level, the choice of working language should be informed by the languages of the said province. Careful consideration should be given to use at least three dominant languages of the province.
- 8.2.3 Oral Communication: External oral communication of the Ministry, the Director-General (DG) and senior officials must be in English or the language of the target audience. If the Minister or a DPW official cannot speak the language of the target audience, an interpreter must be provided. South African Sign Language (SASL) should be considered provided practicality and expense do permit it. It should be noted that where required, provision will be made to assist deaf and blind people to do business with the DPW in a way that accommodates their needs.
- **8.2.4** Written Communication: It will be in the adopted languages and where necessary in all official languages depending on the need.

Language Policy

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- 8.2.5 In cases where the departmental documents may not be made available in all 11 official languages, the Department will make documents available simultaneously in at least six languages. The selection criteria of language shall be as follows:
 - At least one from the Nguni group (isiNdebele, isiXhosa, isiZulu and siSwati);
 - At least one from the Sotho group (Sepedi, Sesotho and Setswana);
 - Tshivenda;
 - Xitsonga;
 - English; and
 - Afrikaans.
 - A principle of rotation should be applied when selecting languages for publishing within the Nguni and Sotho groups respectively and the Language Unit should determine such rotation.
- **8.2.6** External written communication and correspondence with individual citizens will be conducted in their preferred official language.
- 8.2.7 Languages for external communications as regards forms, brochures, letterheads, public notices, signage, etc. in all DPW buildings should take into account regional language preferences. (This includes emergency signage).

The DPW must make documents targeted for specific regions in three languages dominant in the areas.

8.3 Publications

- 8.3.1 All publications will be published in plain language versions of all languages as required. It is important that the publication, whether electronic or in print, must be accessible and understood to all those addressed.
- 8.3.2 Where practically possible, policy documents can be made available in all official languages or on request.
- 8.3.2.1 Language of Response: When dealing with correspondence, the DPW personnel should respond in the same language used by the public.

8.4 Advertising and official notices

- 8.4.1 All official notices issued by the Department as general public information must be in English. Other language requirements will be met on request.
- 8.4.2 When the Department uses local newspapers, consideration must be given to the demographic status. Advertisements in newspapers must be in the languages of the newspaper of a particular region. Depending on financial availability and practicality, they can also be placed in the language of choice of the target group.

8.5 Translations

8.5.1 On request, and where practically possible, major DPW policy documents such as manuals, white papers, etc. can be made available in any international language. When a request is made for a document to be made available in an international language, a reasonable time must be allowed for the translation to such international language.

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- 8.5.2 Translations of official policy documents, where practically possible, must be made available in all official languages, depending on client needs. Where it is not possible, the six-language model will apply.
- **8.5.3** Request for translations of official policy document must be done in writing and ample time should be given for translation purposes.

9. LANGUAGE UNIT

The Department shall ensure that adequate financial and other relevant resources are made available to establish the DPW Language Unit to support and realize the policy.

10. ACCESSING THE POLICY

The policy shall be available in all official languages on request and must be published on the DPW intranet and website. Printed summaries must be available in all official languages and distributed to regions based on the criteria of selected Provincial languages.

11. COMPLAINT MECHANISM

The complaint must:

Any person who is dissatisfied with a decision of the Department regarding its use of official languages may lodge a complaint in any of the 11 official languages and address it to the Director General. If submitted electronically, the complaint must be transmitted to: languageunit@dpw.gov.za or if submitted in hard copy format delivery can either be by hand to the Departments street address or mailed by registered post to the department's postal address which is: **Private Bag x 65 Pretoria 0001**.

- · Be in writing and lodged within 1 months of the complaint arising
- · State the name, address and contact information of the complainant
- Provide a full and detailed description of the complaints.

12. MONITORING AND REVIEW OF THE POLICY

The policy will be constantly monitored and reviewed whenever necessary. This should happen at least once every three (3) years.

13. APPROVAL OF THE POLICY

The Director-General hereby approves the DPW Language Policy that serves to give effect to the Use of Official Languages Act, 2012 (Act No.12 of 2012). It comes into effect from date of the DG's signature.

TRANSPORT APPEAL TRIBUNAL AMENDMENT BILL, 2017

BILL

To amend the Transport Appeal Tribunal Act, 1998 to bring the Act up to date with the developments since the implementation of the Act; to provide for certain powers of the Transport Appeal Tribunal; to allow the Minister to extend the term of the members of the Tribunal; to clarify or simplify various provisions since the implementation of the Act; and to provide for matters connected therewith.

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of the Republic of South Africa as follows:—

Substitution of Long Title of Act 39 of 1998

1. The following is hereby substituted for the Long Title of the Transport Appeal Tribunal Act, 1998 (Act No. 39 of 1998) ("the principal Act"):

"To provide for the establishment of the Transport Appeal Tribunal to consider and decide on appeals noted in terms of the <u>National Land Transport Act</u>, 2009 and the Cross-Border Road Transport Act, 1998; and for matters <u>connected</u> therewith."

Amendment of section 1 of Act 39 of 1998

- 2. Section 1 of the principal Act is hereby amended-
- (a) by the deletion of the definitions of "board", "intraprovincial transport" and "national land transport legislation";
- (b) by the insertion of the following definitions before the definition of "Director-General":
 - "Act" or "this Act" means the Transport Appeal Tribunal Act, 1998 (Act No. 39 of 1998);"

"act, direction or decision" includes-

- (a) an act, direction or decision contemplated in section 92 of the National Land Transport Act;
- (b) a decision contemplated in section 34(1) of the Cross-Border Act;
- (c) a decision to cancel an operating licence in terms of section 78 of the National Land Transport Act;
- (d) a decision to withdraw, suspend or amend an operating licence or permit in terms of section 79 of the National Land Transport Act;
- (e) a decision by the National Public Transport Regulator, as defined in section 1 of the National Land Transport Act, on an application for accreditation made to it under section 81(2) of the National Land Transport Act or renewal of such accreditation in terms of section 81(8) of that Act:
- (f) an administrative action by a regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee that is subject to judicial review in terms of section 6(2) of the Promotion of Administrative Justice Act, 2000 (Act No. 3 of 2000), and
- (g) any other act, direction, decision or omission by a regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee made in the process of implementing the National Land Transport Act or Cross-Border Act.
- <u>""Cross-Border Act"</u> means the Cross-Border Road <u>Transport Act</u>, 1998 (Act No. 4 of 1998);"
- (c) by the insertion of the following definition after the definition of "Minister":
 - ""National Land Transport Act" means the National Land Transport Act, 2009 (Act No. 5 of 2009)"; and
- (d) by the insertion of the following definition after the definition of "Regulatory Committee":
 - ""regulatory entity" means a regulatory entity as defined in section 1 of the National Land Transport Act:".

Amendment of section 4 of Act 39 of 1998

- Section 4 of the principal Act is hereby amended—
- (a) by substituting the following for subsection (1):
 - "(1) The Tribunal consists of not more than nine, but not less than five, members appointed by the Minister [after consultation with every member of the Executive Council in every province responsible for road transport matters]."
- (b) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (2):
 - "(a) appoint fit and proper persons as members of the Tribunal on the grounds of their knowledge of, or experience in, [financial,] economic, commercial, legal, public transport or other matters relating to the functions of the Tribunal; and"

Amendment of section 7 of Act 39 of 1998

- **4.** Section 7 of the principal Act is hereby amended by the addition of the following subsection:
 - "(4) Despite subsection (3), the Minister may, upon expiry of the term of office of a member of the Tribunal, extend the term of office of that member for a period not exceeding twelve months."

Amendment of section 9 of Act 39 of 1998

- 5. Section 9 of the principal Act is hereby amended by substituting the following for subsection (1):
 - "(1) The Tribunal will sit on such days and during such hours and at such place as the chairperson of the Tribunal may determine in consultation with the Director-General."

Amendment of section 11 of Act 39 of 1998

6. The following is substituted for section 11 of the principal Act:

"Fees in respect of appeals

11. The Tribunal may not deal with any appeal noted under the [national land transport legislation] National Land Transport Act or under the Cross-Border [Road Transport] Act, [1998,] unless any such appeal is accompanied by the fees referred to in section 17(1)(a)."

Amendment of section 12 of Act 39 of 1998

- 7. Section 12 of the principal Act is hereby amended—
- (a) by substituting the following for the words preceding paragraph (a) in subsection (1):
 - "(1) Subject to **[the provisions of]** this Act, the Tribunal must consider an appeal noted with the Tribunal in accordance with the **[provisions of the national land transport legislation]** National Land Transport Act or the Cross-Border **[Road Transport]** Act, **[1998]** as the case may be, whereupon the Tribunal may—"
- (b) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (1):
 - "(a) [reject] dismiss the appeal and confirm the act, direction or decision appealed against; or"
- (c) by substituting the following for sub-paragraphs (i) and (ii) of paragraph (b):

- "(i) substitute therefor any other act, direction or decision which the **[board]**regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, could have performed or given; or
- (ii) refer the matter which gave rise to the appeal to the **[board]** regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, for reconsideration; or"
- (c) by substituting the following for subsections (2) and (3):
 - "(2) No decision taken by the Tribunal under this section may be inconsistent with the **[national land transport legislation]** National Land Transport Act or the Cross-Border [Road Transport] Act, [1998,] as the case may be.
 - (3) Any act, direction or decision of the Tribunal under subsection(1)(b)(i) or (c) will, except for the purposes of subsection (1), be deemed to be an act, direction or decision of the **[board]** regulatory entity or Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, against whose act, direction or decision the appeal was brought."
 - (d) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (4):
 - "(a) within the prescribed period cause the parties involved in the appeal to be notified in writing of the decision of the Tribunal , including any time limits specified by the Tribunal for the implementation of such decision;".
 - (e) by the addition of the following subsections:
 - "(5) Where a regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee fails to implement or give effect to a ruling of the Tribunal within the time specified by the Tribunal, or within a time considered by the Tribunal to be reasonable, the Tribunal may issue a directive to the regulatory entity or Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, describing the extent of its failure to comply with its obligations and stating the steps required to meet those obligations, and the regulatory entity or Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, must comply with such directive within the time specified by the Tribunal in the notice.
 - (6) Where the Tribunal issues a directive under subsection (5), it must notify the Director-General and request the Director-General to notify—
 - (a) the Minister in the case where the directive is issued to the Regulatory

 Committee or to the National Public Transport Regulator as defined in section

 1 of the National Land Transport Act;
 - (b) the relevant MEC in the case where the directive is issued to a Provincial Regulatory Entity as defined in that section, or
 - (c) the council of the relevant municipality in the case where the directive is issued to a Municipal Regulatory Entity as defined in that section.

of the issuing of the directive and request the Director General and the Minister, MEC or council, as the case may be, to assist in assuring compliance with the directive."

Amendment of section 13 of Act 39 of 1998

- **8.** Section 13 of the principal Act is hereby amended by substituting the following for paragraphs (a) and (b):
 - "(a) grant an application for condonation of the late filing of an appeal against the act, direction or decision of the [board] regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, provided the appeal is noted in the prescribed manner and within the prescribed period, or refuse such an application; or
 - (b) grant or refuse an application to suspend the operation of any act, direction or decision appealed against, provided that such an act, direction or decision shall automatically be suspended where the appeal was lodged within 30 days after such act, direction or decision was communicated to the appellant."

Amendment of section 14 of Act 39 of 1998

- Section 14 of the principal Act is hereby amended—
- (a) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (4):
 - "(4)(a) Where, in terms of the [national land transport legislation] National Land Transport Act or the Cross-Border [Road Transport] Act, [1998,] it would have been permissible for the [board] regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, to take a person's road transport law enforcement profile or previous traffic or transport-related contraventions into consideration, the Tribunal may compel any such person to give self-incriminating evidence, but the person presiding at the appeal must direct that such evidence will be given in camera and that it will not be made public in any manner whatsoever, except by order of a competent court for the purposes of review or appeal."
- (b) by the addition of the following subsections:
 - "(5) The Tribunal must investigate any delay caused by a person in the completion of its proceedings or frivolous actions on the part of any person in the course of its proceedings, which appears to the Tribunal to be unreasonable and which could cause substantial prejudice to the State, the appellant or any other interested party, and must consider the following factors in deciding whether a delay or frivolous action is unreasonable:
 - (a) The duration of the delay or action;
 - (b) the reasons advanced for the delay or action;
 - (c) whether any person can be blamed for the delay or action;
 - (d) the effect of the delay or action on the personal or financial circumstances of the State, the appellant or any other interested party, or
 - (e) any other factor which in the opinion of the Tribunal should be taken into account.

- (6) If the Tribunal finds that the completion of its proceedings is being delayed unreasonably, it may issue any such order that it deems fit to eliminate the delay or frivolous action and any prejudice resulting from it or to prevent further delay or prejudice, including an order—
- (a) refusing further postponement of the proceedings:
- (b) granting a postponement subject to such conditions as it may determine."

Amendment of section 16 of Act 39 of 1998

- 10. Section 16 of the principal Act is hereby amended by substituting the following for subsection (1):
 - "(1) The Director-General must, [after consultation with the Tribunal,] designate such officers in the Department of Transport as may be necessary to perform the administrative and secretarial work of the Tribunal and any investigations required by the Tribunal that are necessary for the taking of its decisions."

Amendment of section 17 of Act 39 of 1998

- 11. Section 17 of the principal Act is hereby amended by substituting the following for paragraph (b) of subsection (1):
 - "(b) as to the information to be provided by the [board] regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee to the Tribunal or an applicant in connection with any appeal, and the manner in which and the time within which such information must be provided;"

Amendment of section 18 of Act 39 of 1998

- 12. Section 18 of the principal Act is hereby amended—
- (a) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (1):
 - "(a) any matter corresponding to that in respect of which the [Board] board as defined in section 1 of the National Land Transport Transition Act, 2000 (Act No. 22 of 2000) is authorised by law to perform or give any act, direction or decision;"
- (b) by substituting the following for paragraph (a) of subsection (3):
 - "(a) subsection (1)(a) will come into operation on the date on which the [national land transport legislation] National Land Transport Transition Act, 2000 comes into operation, subject to the National Land Transport Act;"

Short title and commencement

13. This Act is called the Transport Appeal Tribunal Amendment Act, 2017.

MEMORANDUM ON THE OBJECTS OF THE TRANSPORT APPEAL TRIBUNAL AMENDMENT BILL, 2017

1. BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

The Transport Appeal Tribunal Act, 1998 (Act No. 39 of 1998) ("the principal Act") was passed in 1998 to create the Transport Appeal Tribunal (TAT) for the purpose of dealing with appeals relating to applications for road carrier permits (now called operating licences). Prior to the establishment of the TAT the National Transport Commission was responsible for dealing with such appeals.

The National Land Transport Transition Act 22 of 2000 (Transition Act) read with the Transport Appeal Matters Amendment Act 70 of 1998 provided that persons who applied to the Regulatory Committee of the Cross-Border Road Transport Agency (CBRTA) or to an operating licensing board for an operating licence, and were aggrieved by the decision of the Regulatory Committee or board, could appeal to the TAT.

Section 128 of the Transition Act provided that provinces could establish their own provincial appeal bodies to hear appeals in respect of operating licence applications. These provincial appeal bodies would replace the TAT in the relevant province. A few provinces did establish such provincial appeal bodies.

In 2007 the then Minister commissioned the *National Land Transport Strategy for the Drafting of the National Land Transport Bill.* This Strategy recommended the following:

- "A new <u>national regulatory entity</u> should be established. It should deal with all long-distance and tourist service operating licence (OL) applications, and perform an oversight role over the regulatory entities in other spheres and serve as their appeal body. (Alternatively this could be done by the Transport Appeal Tribunal.) It should develop standardised nationally-applicable procedures for the processing of all OL applications and decisions. These procedures should be gazetted as regulations to the new Act and will be binding on the regulatory entities in other spheres.
- The Transport Appeal Tribunal (TAT) should be retained as an appeal body for decisions made by the national regulatory entity."

In the process of drafting the National Land Transport Act 5 of 2009 (NLTA) it was decided-

- a) to establish the National Public Transport Regulator (NPTR) as a national body to deal with operating licences for interprovincial and tourist transport, among other functions:
- b) that the TAT should be retained as the appeal body for all appeals, and
- c) that the provincial appeal bodies should be dis-established.

These matters are provided for in the NLTA. In terms of the NLTA, the TAT must hear appeals from the following, which are collectively called regulatory entities:

- a) The NPTR appeals relating to operating licences for interprovincial and tourist transport services. The NPTR started operating on 29 July 2016, and is at present only dealing with licences for tourist transport services as well as applications for accreditation of tourist transport operators. Its other functions will be phased in over time.
- b) The Provincial Regulatory Entities (PREs).
- c) Municipal Regulatory Entities (MREs). To date no MREs have been established, but some cities have applied to establish them.

Since its establishment the TAT has encountered a number of problems and issues, which require amendments to the principal Act. The principal Act also requires to be updated in respect of developments since 1998. These problems and issues are addressed in the Bill and are elaborated in the Clause-by-Clause Analysis in 2 below.

2. CLAUSE-BY-CLAUSE ANALYSIS

2.1 Clause 1: Substitution of Long Title of Act 39 of 1998

Clause 1 will replace the Long Title of the principal Act to give effect to developments since the passing of the Act in 1998.

2.2 Clause 2: Amendment of section 1 of Act 39 of 1998

Clause 2 deletes, substitutes and adds certain definitions. Redundant definitions of "board", "interprovincial transport" and "national land transport legislation" are deleted. The concept of "board" has been replaced by "regulatory entity" in the NLTA. The term "interprovincial transport" was only relevant to provincial appeal bodies, which no longer exist. The term "national land transport legislation" was included in the Act because such legislation had not yet been enacted in 1998. The term is replaced by a reference to the NLTA.

A new definition of "act, direction or decision" is inserted to clarify and expand upon the acts, directions and decisions which are subject to appeal by the TAT, to address doubts expressed about this in the past. The TAT will also be empowered to hear appeals against administrative actions by a regulatory entity or the Regulatory Committee of the CBRTA that are subject to judicial review in terms of section 6(2) of the Promotion of Administrative Justice Act, 2000 (Act No. 3 of 2000).

A new definition of "Cross-Border Act" is inserted to make it easier to read the principal Act and to standardise with the same definition in the NLTA.

A new definition of "National Land Transport Act" is inserted to replace the general reference to land transport legislation.

A new definition of "regulatory entity" is inserted to standardise with the NLTA.

2.3 Clause 3: Amendment of section 4 of Act 39 of 1998

The principal Act provides that the Minister must consult with the nine provincial MECs before appointing TAT members. This has proved to be unworkable and unnecessary, and clause 3(a) of the Bill will remove this requirement.

Also, the Act does not provide for the appointment of members with expertise in public transport matters, which will be cured by clause 3(b) of the Bill.

2.4 Clause 4: Amendment of section 7 of Act 39 of 1998

In terms of the principal Act, TAT members must be appointed for a fixed term of office, but not for longer than three years. It sometimes happens that it would be expedient for the terms of office of individual members to be extended, for example to enable them to deal with matters that are partly completed because of their knowledge of or insight into a matter. Clause 4 of the Bill will allow the Minister to extend the period of office of any member for a period not exceeding one year.

2.5 Clause 5: Amendment of section 9 of Act 39 of 1998

It is important for the TAT when fixing dates and times for hearings, to consult with the Director-General of the Department (DG) so that the necessary administrative arrangements can be put in place timeously subject to budgetary considerations. Clause 5 of the Amendment Bill will require the TAT to consult the DG before fixing such dates and times.

2.6 Clause 6: Amendment of section 11 of Act 39 of 1998

This clause makes consequential amendments to section 11 of the principal Act.

2.7 Clause 7: Amendment of section 12 of Act 39 of 1998

This clause makes consequential amendments and improvements to section 12 of the principal Act as well as the following:

Sometimes when the TAT takes a decision imposing duties on parties, such as a regulatory entity, it is advisable for the TAT to impose time limits for performing the duty to ensure implementation of the TAT's decision. Clause 7(d) of the Bill will empower the TAT to impose such time limits when it makes its decision known to the relevant parties.

It often happens that regulatory entities or the Regulatory Committee fail to implement or give effect to a ruling of the TAT within the time specified by the TAT, or within a reasonable time, or at all. Clause 7(e) of the Bill thus provides that the TAT may issue a directive to the regulatory entity or Regulatory Committee, as the case may be, describing the extent of its failure to comply with its obligations and stating the steps required to meet those obligations, and that such entity must comply with the directive within the time specified by the TAT. It also provides that when such a directive is issued, the TAT must notify the Minister, or relevant MEC, as the case may be, so that they can assist in assuring compliance with such directives.

2.8 Clause 8: Amendment of section 13 of Act 39 of 1998

This clause makes consequential amendments to section 13 of the principal Act.

2.9 Clause 9: Amendment of section 14 of Act 39 of 1998

It sometimes happens in proceedings before the TAT that parties deliberately delay the proceedings, for example where the TAT's decision is likely to have an adverse effect on the finances of the delaying party. Parties also sometimes engage in frivolous actions, either to cause delays or for other reasons. These actions not only waste the time of the TAT and cause wasted costs, but are also unfair to the other party or parties to the appeal. Clause 9(b) of the Bill will allow the TAT to investigate such delays or frivolous actions and take certain steps to counter them as listed in the Bill.

This clause also makes consequential amendments to section 14 of the principal Act.

2.10 Clause 10: Amendment of section 16 of Act 39 of 1998

The principal Act currently provides that the DG must appoint officers in the Department to perform the administrative and secretarial work of the TAT. Clause 10 of the Bill will also permit such staff to be appointed to undertake investigations that are necessary for the TAT to reach its decisions.

2.11 Clause 11: Amendment of section 17 of Act 39 of 1998

To amend the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, the Human Sciences Research Act, 2008, the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008, and the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, so as to harmonise the processes for the termination of the membership of Boards or Councils of the entities established by these Acts; to clarify the requirements for the disqualification of persons from membership of Boards or Councils; to provide for the appointment of external persons to committees of Boards or Councils; to provide for the determination of the remuneration and allowances of members of the Boards or Councils and committees of the Boards or Councils by the Minister in consultation with the Minister of Finance; to provide for consultation with the Minister in the appointment of the Chief Executive Officers of the entities; to provide for the limitation of the term of office of the Chief Executive Officers of the entities, to provide for the determination by the Boards or Councils of the procedures at the Boards' or Councils' meetings; to provide for the procedure for the convening of the Boards' or Councils' meetings at the request of the members

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MEMORANDUM ON OBJECTS OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY LAWS AMENDMENT BILL, 2017

1. BACKGROUND

The Department of Science and Technology has recognised a need to harmonise the provisions which regulate the operations and governance of the public entities that report to the Minister established in terms of the following statutes: the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, the Human Sciences Research Act, 2008, the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008 and the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, in order to ensure consistency in all the requirements to be met and processes to be followed.

2. OBJECTS OF BILL

- 2.1 The Bill seeks to, among others, harmonise the following:
- (a) the processes for the determination of the remuneration and allowances of the members of the Boards or Councils and members of the committees of the Boards or Councils, and the termination of membership of Boards or Councils of the entities, as well as the disqualification of members or potential members from the membership of Boards or Councils;
- (b) the processes for the appointment of Chief Executive Officers of the entities as well as the secondment of employees of the entities and the determination of the conditions of appointment or secondment of such employees; and

- (c) the provisions relating to the delegation of powers by the Boards or Councils of the entities to individual members or committees of the Boards or Councils, and provides for such delegations to be in writing.
- 2.2 The Bill also seeks to provide for the disclosure of interest by members of the Boards or Councils and the timeframes for making such disclosures to the Minister.
- 2.3 It further outlines instances upon which the members of Boards or Councils are prohibited from participating or voting in Boards or Councils' meetings, as well as the requirements to ensure the validity of Boards or Councils' decisions adopted under certain circumstances.

3. KEY PROVISIONS OF BILL

- 3.1 Scientific Research Council Act, 1988 (Act No. 46 of 1988)
- 3.1.1 Clause 1 of the Bill seeks to amend section 7 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by repealing the provisions that require the endorsement of the Board's decisions on certain matters by Minister or the Minister of Finance, as they undermine the institutional autonomy of the Council. It also seeks to provide for consultation by the Minister with the Board before terminating a member's term of office for specific valid reasons.
- 3.1.2 **Clause 2** of the Bill seeks to amend section 7A of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the Minister to submit a report concerning the dissolution of the Board to Parliament instead of to the National Assembly.

- 3.1.3 Clause 3 of the Bill seeks to amend section 9 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the appointment by the Board of any suitable person to be a member of a committee of the Board. It also seeks to provide for the determination of the remuneration and allowances of the members of the committees of the Board, who are not employees of the Council, by the Minister in consultation with the Minister of Finance.
- 3.1.4 Clause 4 of the Bill seeks to amend section 10 of the Scientific Research

 Council Act, 1988, by requiring the Board to consult with the Minister before

 appointing the Chief Executive Officer. It also provides for the limitation of the term of

 office of the Chief Executive Officer to ensure consistency with other entities

 reporting to the Minister.
- 3.1.5 Clause 5 of the Bill seeks to amend section 11 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the determination by the Board of the procedure for its meetings. It also harmonises the process and requirements for holding special meetings of the Board to ensure consistency with other entities reporting to the Minister. It also seeks to provide for the disclosure of interest by members of the Board and timeframes for making such disclosures to the Minister as well as the circumstances in which the members of Board are prohibited from participating or voting in Board meetings.

- 3.1.6 **Clause 6** of the Bill seeks to amend section 12 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the determination of the conditions of appointment or secondment of employees of the Council by the Board.
- 3.1.7 Clause 7 of the Bill seeks to amend section 14 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the repeal of the provisions relating to the auditing of the accounts of the Council and submission by the Minister of the annual reports to Parliament, as such matters are provided for in the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999).
- 3.1.8 Clause 8 of the Bill seeks to amend section 15 of the Scientific Research

 Council Act, 1988, by providing for the repeal of the provisions relating to the
 investment of the funds of the Council, as such matters are provided for in the Public

 Finance Management Act, 1999.
- 3.1.9 Clause 9 of the Bill seeks to prohibit the liquidation of the Council other than in accordance with the Scientific Research Council Act. 1988.
- 3.1.10 Clause 10 of the Bill seeks to amend section 18 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by requiring the Minister to consult with the Board before making any regulations relating to all substantive matters provided for in the Act. It also seeks to repeal certain other provisions which empower the Minister to make regulations on matters that have become redundant.

- 3.1.11 **Clause 11** of the Bill seeks to amend section 19 of the Scientific Research Council Act, 1988, by providing for the delegation by Board of its powers to any member or committee of the Board as well as for the delegation of powers to be made in writing.
- 3.2 Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001 (Act No. 67 of 2001)
- 3.2.1 Clause 12 of the Bill seeks to insert the definition of Executive Officer of the Academy in the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001.
- 3.2.2 Clause 13 of the Bill seeks to amend section 2 of the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, by repealing the provision requiring the Academy to comply with the Public Finance Management Act, 1999, as the Academy is not listed under the Public Finance Management Act.
- 3.2.3 Clause 14 of the Bill amends section 5 of the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, to provide for the requirement for a candidate's eligibility for membership of the Academy. It further provides for the Council to elect a candidate to serve as a member of the Academy.
- 3.2.4 Clause 15 of the Bill seeks to amend section 6 of the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, by providing for the Council of the Academy to be broadly representative of the demographics of the Republic. - 3.2.5 Clause 16 of the Bill seeks to amend section 7 of the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, by providing for the resignation of the Council members to be made in writing to the Minister and for the termination of the term of office of a member of the Council for any valid reason by the Minister to be made on the recommendation of the Council.
 - 3.2.6 Clause 17 of the Bill seeks to amend section 8 of the Academy of Science of South Africa Act, 2001, by providing for the appointment by the Council of any suitable person to be a member of a committee of the Council. It also provides for the establishment of an Appeals Committee and for the manner in which the Appeals Committee shall be constituted as well as the timeframes for the determination of appeals.
- 3.2.7 Clause 18 of the Bill seeks to provide for the determination of the remuneration and allowances of members of the committees of the Council who are not employees of the Academy by the Minister in consultation with the Minister of Finance. - 3.3.8 Clause 28 of the Bill seeks to amend section 11 of the Human Sciences
 Research Council Act, 2008, by providing for the determination by the Board of the
 conditions of employment of the employees of the Council.

 Executive Officer of its or his or her powers to be in writing.
- 3.3.12 Clause 32 of the Bill seeks to prohibit the liquidation of the Council other than in accordance with an Act of Parliament.
- 3.3.13 **Clause 33** of the Bill seeks to amend section 17 of the Human Sciences Research Council Act, 2008, by requiring the Minister to consult with the Board before making any substantive regulations.
- 3.4 Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008 (Act No. 26 of 2008)
- 3.4.1 **Clause 34** of the Bill seeks to amends section 2 of the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008, by deleting certain words which are superfluous.

- 3.4.2 **Clause 35** of the Bill seeks to provide for the performance by the Agency of any of its functions outside the Republic, subject to the Minister's consent.
- 3.4.3 Clause 36 of the Bill seeks to amend section 5 of the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008 in the same way as described in clause 2 above.
- 3.4.4 Clause 37 of the Bill seeks to amend section 6 of the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008, by providing for a period within which a person will be disqualified from being a member of the Board after being convicted for fraud, corruption or any other crime involving dishonesty. It also extends the qualification for membership of the Board to permanent residents.
- 3.4.5 Clause 38 of the Bill seeks to amend section 7 of the Technology and Innovation Agency Act, 2008, by providing that resignation of a member from the Board must be on written notice to the Minister.
- 3.4.6 Clause 39 of the Bill seeks to amend section 9 of the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the determination of the remuneration and allowances of the members of the Board committees who are not in the employ of the State by the Minister, in consultation with the Minister of Finance.
- 3.4.7 **Clause 40** of the Bill seeks to amend section 10 of the Technology Innovation Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the quorum of a Board meeting to be a majority of members eligible to vote at that meeting to ensure consistency with other entities. It also provides for the circumstances in which members of the Board are prohibited

from participating or voting in the Board's meetings as well as the disclosure of interest by Board members and the timeframes for such disclosures.

- 3.5 South African National Space Agency Act, 2008 (Act No. 36 of 2008)

- 3.5.2 Clause 48 of the Bill seeks to amends section 7 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by deleting subsection (5) of that section.
- 3.5.3 Clause 49 of the Bill seeks to amend section 8 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the Minister to consult with the Board before terminating the term of office of a member of the Board for any valid reason. It also provides for the resignation of the Board members to be made in writing to the Minister.
- 3.5.4 Clause 50 of the Bill seeks to amend section 11 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by clarifying the issue of the status of decisions of the Board that were adopted under certain circumstances.
- 3.5.5 **Clause 51** of the Bill seeks to amend section 12 of the South African National Space Agency, 2008, by providing that the members of the Board must disclose

annually any interest that may compromise the performance of the functions of the Board.

- 3.5.6 Clause 52 of the Bill seeks to amend section 13 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the Board to designate a chairperson for any of its committees.
- 3.5.7 **Clause 53** of the Bill amends section 13A of the South African National Space Agency, 2008, in the same way as described in clause 2 above.
- 3.5.8 Clause 54 of the Bill seeks to amend section 14 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the Board to consult with the Minister before appointing the Chief Executive Officer of the Agency. It also provides for a limitation of the term of office of the Chief Executive Officer.
- 3.5.9 Clause 55 of the Bill seeks to amend section 15 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by the providing for the determination of the conditions of employment of the employees of the Agency by the Board. It also provides for the Chief Executive Officer of the Agency to second employees of the Agency and for the Board to determine the conditions of secondment of those employees.
- 3.5.10 **Clause 56** of the Bill seeks to amend section 18 of the South African National Space Agency Act, 2008, by providing for the delegation by the Board of its powers.

- 3.5.11 Clause 57 of the Bill seeks to prohibit the liquidation of the Council other than in accordance with an Act of Parliament.
- 3.5.12 **Clause 58** of the Bill provides for the short title and the commencement of the Bill.

4. PARTIES CONSULTED

All affected stakeholders (relevant science councils), were consulted individually.

5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS FOR STATE

There will be no cost implications to the state in relation to the implementation of the Bill. The proposed amendments are purely of an administrative or technical nature.

6. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

- 6.1 The State Law Advisers and the Department of Science and Technology have agreed that Science and Technology Amendment Bill should be dealt with in terms of the procedure established by section 75 of the Constitution, since it does not contain provisions to which the procedure set out in section 76 of the Constitution applies.
- 6.2 The State Law Advisers also advised that it is not necessary to refer this Bill to the National House of Traditional Leaders in terms of section 18(1)(a) of the Traditional Leadership and Governance Framework Act, 2003 (Act No. 41 of 2003), since it does not contain provisions pertaining to customary law or customs of traditional communities.
